
ZONING REPORT - JANUARY 2022

There were no issues presented to the Elkhart County Zoning Board of Appeals during the months of November and December in the Simonton Lake area.

UPDATE: PLANNED TRAILER PARK PROJECT CANCELED

A trailer park planned for the Heaton Lake area, just a little over five miles from Simonton Lake has been canceled. While this project was not in the immediate Simonton Lake area, the fact that such a large project was planned for an area so close to a lake was a concern. The Simonton Lake Homeowners Association Board was worried that approval by the Elkhart County Zoning Board of Appeals would set a precedent for future projects so close to other lakes.



Heaton Lake is approximately 5 miles southeast of Simonton Lake

In late October David Kelly, the developer, stated that he was unable to get support from the city/county zoning boards and had canceled the project.

A major hurdle to this project was attaching to a sewer system. The Simonton Lake Conservancy system was not willing to add these residents outside of their district. The other option was hooking on to the City of Elkhart.

Drainage was another issue. There was great concern over contaminants that might go into the watershed and leach into Heaton Lake from the large development.

Heaton Lake residents expressed thanks for the assistance they received from Simonton Lake residents. A special thanks was sent out to Bob Evans for his endless supply of resources and for representing Heaton Lake at the County Commissioner Board meeting and George Bryerton for setting up the use the Simonton Lake clubhouse for their steering committee meetings. The many letters and phone calls made by residents to county officials helped to tip the scales.

This just proves that regular citizens working together can have an impact. We Simonton Lake Area residents need to protect our lake by keeping an eye on developments that might affect our lake.



ASSUME ALL ICE OUT THERE IS THIN ICE

- From the Safety Committee

These safety reminders come to us from the Indiana DNR:

- Drill a test hole near shore. Your test hole should show at least a four-inch thickness of clear ice like the ice you get from your freezer.
- 2. Wear a life jacket for extra warmth and safety.
- **3.** Not all the ice on the lake is the same thickness.
- **4.** Ice strength can also change. Thick ice is rotten after rain. Old honey-combed ice or slushy ice is weak ice.
- 5. Wind, waterfowl, and beavers can also keep areas of ice from being thick.
- 6. The water in the area near Lily Creek may still be flowing into the creek. Flowing water under the ice makes the ice unreliable.
- **7.** Water near an aerator may freeze with inconsistencies in the thickness.
- 8. Underground springs and wind can cause weakness in the ice.



ICE FISHING REMINDERS

- Indiana law limits ice fishing holes to a diameter of twelve inches.
- Fishing shanties must have reflectors on each side so snowmobiles won't crash into them at dusk or during snowstorms.

ICE SAFETY GUIDELINES

ICE THICKNESS	WHAT TO DO
1" of ice	STAY OFF!!!
4" of ice	Needed for safe ice fishing
5" of ice	Needed for snowmobiling
8" of ice	Needed to support the weight of a car or light truck
10" of ice	Needed to support a medium weight truck

If you see a pet or other animal in distress on the ice, do not venture out after it. The ice may be able to support the pet or animal, but not you. Instead, contact local emergency response personnel, who are trained and equipped to make rescues on thin ice.

RESULTS OF THE ELKHART COUNTY LEAF COLLECTION COMPETITION

At this time, we do not know the outcome of the Elkhart County Leaf Collection contest. As you may know we encouraged lake residents to contact James Wyly of SmokelessLeafs who was one of the contestants. Last year he finished sixth but got a portion of the \$50,000 prize money. Last year he collected leaves from just 6 people around the lake. This year he had 76 people! This was both good and bad. At the end of the contest, December 20 he thought he was in 2nd place. But the amount of work took a toll on his equipment, and he was out of service for three weeks working only by hand.

Still, he kept on and was cleaning up his final piles of leaves working until after dark on that last day.

We did not do an official test of the air quality at the lake, but it sure did feel like there were a lot less days when that gray cloud of leaf smoke covered the lake.

STATE ROAD 19 DRAINAGE PROBLEM

Over 30 years ago, State Road 19 was reconfigured into a four-lane road where it bends around the west end of the lake. A drainage system was installed under the new road by the Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT). Several drains with grates were installed along the curbs as far north as Bell Avenue.

Across the highway from Flippin' Cow, a small retention pond was built. There is a sign near the highway identifying the land as INDOT property. Under the highway a pipe connected the drains. The system was supposed to allow the water from the curb drains to flow via the pipe under the road and into the retention pond away from the lake.

This may have worked for a while, but for many years the water simply flows across the highway towards the Flippin' Cow parking lot, across the asphalt and into the lake. The water carries with it dirt and other highway contaminants and they end up in our lake. This is not good for the lake or for the Flippin Cow owners and patrons.

This fall Conservancy Board members, Mark Lucas and Ryan Matherly did an onsite evaluation.

Lake resident, Bob Evans directed them to an official at INDOT.

Bob Myers was consulted and directed the Conservancy to former state representative, Tim Neese. Tim put them in touch with our current state representative, Doug Miller.

Doug responded quickly and within two weeks an INDOT crew was at the site.

They found that the pipe under the highway was filled with debris and buried in dirt as it came out into the retention pond. The pond had filled in. Under the grates, curbside, debris blocked the flow of water.

Will this fix the problem? We'll see come spring rains.

It is clear that we need to monitor systems put in by the state and county. They only know something is not working when we tell them.

Fifteen years ago, the Lake Association was re-established, and a Newsletter Committee was established. The idea was to put out a newsletter-type publication in black and white four times a year with maybe a picture or two. We decided to call it "Simonton Says."

We were lucky to have a lake resident, Dick Rhodes, who had worked in publishing and advertising as well as his wife, Kay, who was a professional graphic designer and could do layout. Bob Myers stepped up to help with advertising. To top it off, lake resident, Mike Smith owned a printing company. We were black and white in the beginning, and we had very few pictures.

Now, the humble black and white eight-page newsletter has become a color magazine with 36 pages. Jon Hart became our advertising manager and has gotten so many new ads that we increased the number of pages so that the magazine wouldn't be all advertisements. Mike Smith has sold his printing company, but the company still prints Simonton Says.

BLACK BEAR FOUND DEAD NEAR BRISTOL



A dead black bear was found along Indiana 15, just north of the Indiana Toll Road, on Wednesday, August 18, the victim of a car accident, according to the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

Indiana DNR mammalogist Brad Westrich said a motorist noticed the bear just north of Bristol on Wednesday morning. It's unclear how long the animal had been dead, he said Friday.

It marked the first bear sighting in northern Indiana since 2015, when a black bear from Michigan wandered through Berrien, St. Joseph and LaPorte counties — at that time, the first wild bear sighting in Indiana in 144 years. Michigan DNR officials killed that bear in the spring of 2016 near Stevensville, saying it had become a threat to humans.

The body of the Bear killed near Bristol was taken to the Indiana Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory at Purdue University to determine the exact cause of death. Large bones on its body were broken, which is typical of a vehicle collision, he said.

He said this "definitely" isn't the black bear that was witnessed in southern Indiana earlier this summer. Reports of that bear have stopped recently, and Westrich said it's possible that it has since moved on to Kentucky, based on reports in that state.

Black bears are native to Indiana and are listed as a species of special concern. They are protected under Indiana law, which prohibits the taking of a black bear except under certain conditions and by a permit issued only by the Indiana DNR.

BLACK BEAR CHARACTERISTICS

Color: Range in color from black to light blonde. Many black bears have a lighter patch on their chest, and reddish-colored bears are common in the west.

Size: Average 110-300 lbs. Large males can reach 400 lbs and be larger than a female grizzly.

Height: A little smaller, from 2.5-3 ft at the shoulder. Around 5 ft standing.


Shape: No hump like the grizzly.

Face: A straight line runs between the forehead and end of the nose. They have larger, pointed ears.

Claws: Shorter (around 1.5 in)

Prints: Look for a large toe arc, toe imprints will be further apart, and the claws usually don't leave an impression.

uate of Elkhart High School and was on the Elkhart basketball team during the 1954 state championships in Indianapolis. Milan's resulting victory inspired the movie "Hoosiers." He went on to receive an associate degree at Western Michigan University in printing and business administration. He served honorably in the United States Army where he was a topographical surveyor stationed in Iran. Dwight loved his country and often said that serving in the army was one of the best decisions he made. For many years on July 4th, he hosted a flag retirement ceremony lakeside to honor all local veterans.

Dwight was part of the Simonton Lake community for 50 years. He loved to give anyone, and everyone rides on his pontoon boat, and the summer months teemed with family and fun. He also loved family camping and going to Silver Lake to take his dune buggy out for a spin.

Dwight was an accomplished handyman. His years of experience as a millwright certainly gave him the skills needed to make things work again! He was a huge University of Notre Dame fan but appreciated all sports and teams. He had an eclectic taste in music; everything from polkas to marches to big bands of the 50's and 60's, and of course rock and roll. He also really liked to collect tools. If you were involved in a project that needed a left-handed retractable sun switcher, you could pretty much bet that Dwight probably had one.

Dwight was a wonderful and kind person. It will be a sad summer without Dwight out on the lake.



COLD WEATHER SAFETY TIPS

When you are outside, frostbite and hypothermia are possible so you need to protect yourself.

- 1. Wear layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing.
- 2. Wear a hat. Try to stay dry and out of the wind.
- 3. Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold.
- 4. Mittens, snug at the wrist, are better than gloves.

To keep pipes from freezing on an outside wall:

- 1. Let hot and cold water trickle or drip at night from a faucet.
- 2. Open cabinet doors to allow more heat to get to un-insulated pipes under a sink or near an outer wall.
- 3. Make sure heat is left on and set no lower than 55 degrees.
- If you plan to be away:

 Have someone check your house daily to make sure the heat is still on to prevent freezing, or (2) drain and shut off the water system (except indoor sprinkler systems).

IF PIPES FREEZE

- 1. Make sure you and your family knows how to shut off the water, in case pipes burst.
- 2. NEVER try to thaw a pipe with an open flame or torch. Use a hair dryer instead.
- Always be careful of the potential for electric shock in and around standing water.

CARBON MONOXIDE poisoning is a silent, deadly killer claiming about 1,000 lives each year in the United States.

- 1. Install a carbon monoxide detector.
- 2. NEVER run generators indoors.
- Open a window slightly when using a kerosene heater and follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- 4. NEVER use a gas oven to heat your home.
- If your heat goes out, you can keep warm indoors by closing off rooms you do not need, dressing in layers of lightweight clothing, and wearing a cap.

WOOD-BURNING STOVES, FIREPLACES AND HEATERS


- 1. Always keep a screen around an open flame.
- 2. NEVER use gasoline to start your fireplace.
- 3. NEVER burn charcoal indoors.
- 4. Do not close the damper when ashes are hot.
- 5. Use only safe sources of alternative heat such as a fireplace, small well-vented wood or coal stove or portable space heaters. Always follow manufacturer's instructions.

ANIMAL AND PET SAFETY


- 1. Bring pets inside
- 2. Provide shelter and fresh water
- 3. Keep salt away from paws

VEHICLE PREPARATION

- 1. Check your battery
- 2. Check your fluids (coolant, wiper fluid, oil, etc)
- 3. Check your tires
- 4. Have jumper cables
- 5. Pack a blanket



INDIANA DUCKS

Adapted from "OUTDOOR" magazine a publication of the Indiana DNR -

There are four species of ducks that breed in Indiana. We occasionally see other ducks on the lake, but they are just "flying through." Several years ago, we printed pictures of pelicans who were around for a few days. But, again, there are just four species that are native. Whether you like to shoot them with a camera or shoot them for dinner here they are:





BLUE WINGED TEAL

- One of the first to migrate south in the fall
- Female is a mottled brown and has white at the base of her bill
- Male has grayish blue head, white facial crescent, light brown body, and a black tail

HOODED MERGANSER

- Smaller than wood ducks and mallards
- Males and females have distinctive "hoods"
- Females look like her hood feathers are spiked
- Male's hoods are black and white and are larger than the female





- Medium size duck
- Male has green head and white collar
- Female is mottled and brown
- Mallards are the most abundant duck on earth





WOOD DUCK

- Medium size duck that nests in trees
- Male has multicolored (red, black, green, and brown) plumage
- Female is less colorful and has a white eye-ring and throat
