"Pete's:" A Simonton Lake Institution - Part I

o paraphrase an advertising jingle, as American as hot-dogs and apple pie, the neighborhood tavern is truly an important component of our Yankee culture. Taverns are described as primarily being in business to serve the locals, and secondarily to serve travelers. What is often considered the first tavern in America was opened in Boston in 1633. "Cheers" would have to be the best known tavern in the country, "the place where everyone knows your name." These descriptions would apply equally well to "Pete's Simonton Lake Tavern," known by lake residents as "Pete's." This celebrated establishment has been quenching the thirst of locals since the repeal of prohibition in 1933, but the "Pete's" story really begins in February, 1970.

The seeds of "Pete's" were planted much earlier when Pete Kilgren married Lou (Lucille) Cappelletti and purchased the family home on North Shore Drive. Lou's father was the owner of a Harrison Street tavern that he sold and later became Nicki-D's. Then in 1950 he opened Cappy's on Michigan Street, across from Adams and Westlake. Lou Kilgren was well schooled by her family in the fine art of running a commercial kitchen that produced savory Italian dishes. As they say, the rest is history. In 1970 the couple bought the business from


Jack Fidler and changed the name to "Pete's."

"Pete's" has always been a family operation, Pete ran the bar side of the operation and Lou ran the kitchen. Lou's cooking was a huge element in the success of the enterprise that fit perfectly in the Simonton Lake life-style. Residents could spend the day enjoying lake activities and then have a home cooked dinner and cold drink at their neighborhood tavern. In the words of Kate Nusbaum, "It was a local hangout. When Lou and Pete purchased the bar, it took on an Italian flavor. People would come out from town to enjoy their Italian spaghetti. Not only did the men like to hang out there but the wives often joined them for meals which were exceptional." As time went by Pete and Lou's family grew with the addition of Frank, Don, Linda, Lori, and Joe, all

How is the circle of life and our ecosystem changed or affected? One way is by the introduction of invasive species such as milfoil & zebra mussels, spreading primarily by overland boat transport. These are only two of the invasive varieties on our governing agencies' radar at this time. Visit our website for more information on how you can prevent their infiltration into our lake. These two species have altered our nat-

ural environment locally and nationally by affecting other species of plants and wildlife, thus altering the natural order of nature.


Things you can do to help protect our lake and community:

- If you want to help birds and make sure they have a good food supply (fish, crustaceans, etc.) from the lake environment, spread the word about alternatives to pesticides and fertilizers. Organic gardening is becoming very popular among nature lovers.
- 2. Keep all litter out of the lake and the area streets. Bring a trash bag with you on walks or boat rides to pick up trash.




lending a hand in the operation. Then in December 1975, Linda married Merle Anderson, who had moved here from Southern California. Over the years Merle's responsibilities have sort of ebbed and flowed, but for the past several years Merle has been the driving force in the operation.

Merle explains that the business has changed over the years. In the old days, workers from factories on the north side of the city, such as CTS, Miles, Adams and Westlake, and Reese Manufacturing, would hit the bar at the end of a tiring workday. Some days the bar would be lined five rows deep waiting to be served. It was tough for the bartender just to keep up opening bottles of beer. Due to the loss of most of the north side industries, and changes in the driving and alcohol laws, today "Pete's" now caters to a slightly different market. Nowadays there is more emphasis on the dining and entertainment segments of the market. One thing that hasn't changed is that comfortable, neighborhood atmosphere, where when you walk in the door you're going to know the people around you.

Pete passed away in 2003, but his legacy lives on. Merle has a kind of laid back California management style, but you can always see the gears turning. As work was being completed on the new outside patio, Merle was engineering the seating arrangement and landscaping in his mind as we talked. Next February will mark a significant milestone for "Pete's" - their fortieth anniversary of operations, making it one of the oldest family run restaurant-bar businesses in Elkhart. There are a lot of ingredients that make up the unique character of a lake community and Pete's is truly an important ingredient in what we call Simonton Lake.


COMMUNITY UPDATE

The weir, where is it?

he Simonton Lake weir project is a perfect example of why the Kernan-Shepard report, "The Commission on Streamlining Local Government" is getting so much traction with the voting public. Never have so many people wanted ... needed something to happen only to be continually frustrated. No one needs to enlighten lake residents of the fact that the lake level is unusually high and is resulting in basement flooding, street flooding (Fawn Lane), and sea wall erosion. Now some people may say, yes, but it is just an unusually wet year. This of course is true, but lake level is not just a problem of too much inflow, but is complicated by too little release. Simonton Lake has no water control device (weir). State statute precludes dredging streams within three-quarters of a mile of a lake not equipped with a weir. As a result, Lilly Creek has silted up and the discharge flow rate is less than it could be with a weir in place.

Now let's see, who wants the weir? Certainly the residents of Simonton would like to see a water control device that maintains a consistent lake level. The Simonton Lake Sportsmen's Club would prefer a consistent lake level that would not put stress on the local habitat for aquatic plants and animals. Three years ago, May 5, 2006, Superior Court Judge George Biddlecome rendered a decision stating a weir should be installed. Five and a half years ago, December 19, 2003, Deputy Attorney General, Sierra Cutts, stated on the record that the DNR intends to financially support the Simonton Lake weir project. Conversations with Representative Tim Neese and Senator Joe Zakas indicate their support for the project to the degree that in the past legislative session they


tentatively secured two hundred thousand dollars of stimulus money for the project. The Simonton Lake weir project meets the litmus test for being one of those "shovel ready" projects that are so hard to find to qualify for stimulus support. Now that the legislature is going to special session, these funds did not receive approval.

Now there seems to be a small glimmer of hope. The county surveyor's office spent two days (May 20 and 21) surveying and checking elevations in the Lilly Creek area in an effort to conclude the optimum location for a weir. The commissioners have now determined that the first step in the process is to gain approval of the County Drainage Board. It is the intention of the SLAHA to have the project on the Drainage Board's June 16 agenda. If it becomes necessary to use county money for the weir project, it will require endorsement by the commissioners and approval by the County Council.

How can you help? It would certainly be appropriate to thank Representative Neese and Senator Zakas for their support of the project and their continued efforts to secure stimulus funding in the June special session. Clearly commissioners Rodino, Lucchese, and Yoder need to be reminded of the importance of this project to the voting public of Simonton Lake.

We have had friends and neighbors who have been working on this project since 1992—seventeen years. . . SEVEN-TEEN YEARS! The Drainage Board meeting is scheduled for June 16 at 9:00 AM at the county public service building in Dunlap. This project needs your full support. Check the SLAHA website at wwww.simontonlake.org for email addresses of state and county officials and meeting information.

Reminiscences of Tedd Johnson

he "Simonton Says" newsletter committee was delighted to receive these reminiscences from Tedd and Sue Johnson. Sue was the writer.

Back in 1943 Tedd's parents, Freda and Ernie Johnson, decided to buy property on Simonton Lake. The family lived in Elkhart at that time on Goshen Avenue. They bought two pieces of property, one on the lake and one across the street. The property on the lake had to be cleared before a cottage could be built. That cottage was a simple place: one room with a pump and sink, roll up beds and an outhouse toilet. Even though there was no hot water, Tedd remembers it being a great place. Later on Ernie built a new and improved cottage. This one had a bedroom, a bathroom complete with a working toilet and a living room/kitchen space. There was still no hot water but at least it was running water and didn't have to be pumped. There were roll-out beds and a sofa for Tedd and his sister Christen.

In 1960 Tedd came out of the Air Force. His sister graduated from high school that year and she had asked some friends out to the lake. One of her friends would one day become Tedd's wife. Sue says it was love at first sight for her. Tedd says it took quite a while for him to get up the nerve to ask her for a date (Tedd also reports some liquid refreshment helped out.) They've been together ever since that first date.

Sue and Tedd were married on December 31, 1961 and that next summer they lived at the summer cottage. In October of 1962 Tedd and his father bought property at the west end of the lake and started what would be called Johnson Marina. The marina was in business for 25 years. There was a small house that came with the property situated at the top of the hill on Cassopolis Street. The house had two bedrooms and a bathroom but no shower. The living area had a fireplace a small kitchen with a sink and a few cupboards. There was a pull-out bed for sleeping. In the bedroom they stored their clothing and had a baby bed for their daughter, Heidi (This is Heidi Compton, wife of Mike.) When their son Ed came along they added two bedrooms on to the house and made a kitchen in the spare bedroom. Tedd and Sue lived there for eight years. Life was good.

Around 1973 Ernie and Freda let Tedd and Sue build a house across the street from the lake. The two men built the house together and Tedd's family lived there for 30 years. During that time Ernie and Freda decided to sell their house in town and move to the lake for good. They added on to the cottage and lived there until they passed on.

That house was torn down and Tedd and Sue rebuilt a home for the two of them.



e believe that lake health begins at home and encourage residents and visitors to make smart choices when it comes to the environment. There are also smart choices you can do while living or vacationing at the lake this summer to be mindful of the environment and its local inhabitants – the animals!

- Obey the signs at the Public Access and the DNR "No Wake" postings. They protect the seawalls, shoreline and habitats for a number of animals.
- Go green and bug off. Use mint or eucalyptus-based bug repellants to protect your skin and the Earth.
- Have fun learning! Visit nature centers, museums, zoos and aquariums to learn about the local environment.
- Don't use the lake as a bathtub. Soaps and shampoos contain nutrients and pollutants that are harmful to the lake and organisms living in it.

- If you fish, consider putting away your lead sinkers and jigs and switching to non-toxic tackle. Loons, trumpeter swans and some other waterfowl are susceptible to contracting lead poisoning from tackle they pick up off lake bottoms.
- When you buy a boat motor, choose a 4-cycle, rather than 2-cycle, engine. You will lose less gasoline into the water and cause less air pollution.
- Plant a buffer strip of native plants along the water. If you have a lawn, keep it small and don't use fertilizers and pesticides.
- If you have a septic system make sure it functions properly and meets current standards. Consider an alternative wastewater treatment system, such as a composting toilet. Or hook into the Simonton Lake Conservancy.
- Plant a rain garden, use a rain barrel to catch water from your roof, consider using permeable pavement in your driveway – runoff that stays on your property will not wash contaminants into the lake.
- Never dump wastes into a storm drain. Storm sewers may run directly into the lake.
- Learn as much as you can about lakes and the threats they face. A good place to start is "Guide to Lake Protection and Management," a 27-page brochure published by the Freshwater Society in cooperation with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. You can download it at www.freshwater.org.


