There's no place like Simonton Lake on the 4th. Until next time.



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
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## "You Get What You Pay For"

f you register a watercraft in Indiana, you pay a fee that is to be used for lake enhancement. For the last two years, this money was confiscated by the State and placed in the general fund in case it would be needed for balancing the budget. In May, 2011 Governor Daniels signed a bill that reinstated this money for use on lakes and rivers.

Here is a synopsis of LARE and LARE fund collections and uses.

In 1989, The Indiana State Legislature enacted a bill that allowed the Department of Natural Resources to develop Lake and River Enhancement (LARE) to ensure the continued viability of public access lakes and streams. The initial goal was to utilize a watershed approach to see that Indiana's surface water meets or surpasses the state water quality standards.

The 2003 Indiana General Assembly enacted House Enrolled Act 1336 which INCREASED the LARE fee paid by registered vessel owners. The increase in fees provides funding to remove sediment and control invasive plants and animals.

In addition, one third of the fees provide funding for the Law Enforcement Division (DNR officers) to establish MORE patrols on Indiana lakes and rivers. A portion of these funds may be used by counties for supplemental enforcement marine patrols by your county sheriff's department.

The 2003 increase is based on the value of the vessel when new.

Value of vessel	Fee
Less than \$1,000	\$5
At least \$1,000 but	
less than \$3,000	\$10
At least \$3,000 but	
less than \$5,000	\$15
At least \$5,000 but	
less than \$10,000	\$20
At least \$10,000	\$25

If your vessel is a pontoon boat or speedboat, your cost new was more than \$10,000. You are paying \$25 each year to the LARE fund when you pay your boat registration fee for each of these boats.

On July 1, 2011, the new bill reinstates the use of LARE funds to be used for implementing lake and river enhancement projects and one half to be used by the Department of Natural Recourses to pay for lake or river projects including removal of sediment and control of exotic or invasive plants or animals as well as the removal of logjams or obstructions.

More than \$3,700,000 is generated each year by the LARE fee. The Simonton Lake Home-

owners Association recently had a study completed (summary of the study available on page 26 of May issue 2011 *Simonton Says* and the full study will be available online soon) for which LARE funds were used along with Association dollars. This LARE grant was one of the last issued by the state. However, now that the dedicated boat fees have been allocated to the LARE group, other grants will be..... well granted.


Just remember, this season, when you register a new boat, and when you renew your registration on your existing vessels, that your dedicated \$25 is going to, once again, be used for the improvement of our lakes and rivers. ■

## Nadine Still Calls Simonton Her Home After 67 Years!

A s promised in the May newsletter, I wanted to continue to explore the memories of some of our "oldies" on the lake with whom we met in March and had a lively discussion about the early days on Simonton. I decided to "pick the brain" of Nadine Phillips Anderson. Nadine has lived on Simonton Lake since 1944 when she was 11 years old. Her parents, Roy and Eva Phillips moved from Goshen to the northern side of Elkhart to be closer to work. They found their two bedroom home on North

Shore. In comparison with some of the homes on the lake at that time, it was quite suitable for year

around living as it did have inside plumbing! Nadine recalls three families fairly close to her home whom were full time residents. It instantly provided opportunities for making friends and finding out what living on a lake was all about.

The fond memories of growing up on the lake center around friends, family and the lake. Her best friends were Anne and Marilyn Marchesseau, Wonda and Wilma Massey and Betty Bliss. She said the kids on the lake played and hung out in groups including boys and girls. In the summer, the bathing suit

> was the dress of choice. Swimming and all that could be done on the lake was the most common activity. Of course, the boats were mostly of the row boat variety so one would




hop in and row across the lake to visit a friend. Also, permanent rafts on the lake were great attractions and places to hang out. Playing cards, riding bikes and going down to one of the gas stations were common activities. Did you know there was a gas station at the corner of Bell Avenue and Cassopolis Street? In the winter they had bonfires and ice skating. A rink was always kept clean and ready for skating. (Was the weather different back then? My experience today has been that we rarely have ice that is decent enough for skating??)

Nadine went to Osolo School (the old building sat at the corner where the present school sits today).

Ms. Mary Feeser was principal and known to be very strict; Nadine shared that her brother was paddled quite often. See Nadine/ pg. 12

There was a bus; Poppy Glick was the bus driver. He would pick them up in the evenings for special occasions and take them to football and basketball games in town. At that time she went to school at Elkhart High School, downtown. When the kids were in high school they would take the Greyhound Bus to town. They would go into a show or just hang out. They only had to stand out on Cassopolis Street at the end of the lake and, per schedule, it would pick up and bring them back.

Last month, you may remember the article on Allenton. Kids in the summer would walk up to Allenton and watch movies or just hang out and see who was there. Nadine remembers her mother carefully curling her hair to prepare for the big evening. And, there was the Sugar Shack in the woods that they were forbidden to go to by their parents. but they did seem to courageously make it there. It was an old shack that was far into the woods past where the road ended. Not much happened there (she chuckles) but it was a source of possible stories, adventure and a place to explore. Most of the land behind them was the Sellers Farm which consisted of a lot of woods to explore. They would also walk along the lake past where the road ended on North Shore

and a popular swimming hole welcomed them.

The Conservation Club, which was in the woods at the end of Lakeview, was a popular place during those days. They would have activities for families such as bonfires, free shows, ice skating and parties. (See the pictures of the Halloween Party). We are trying to find out more about this club, as our past stories have always included references to it. If any of you out there have more infor-

mation, let me know. Sounds like an interesting place for the Simonton Lake residents of its day.

Nadine continues to enjoy her home today. She lives across the street on North Shore from where her parents moved in 1944. Nadine and her late husband, Rodney, built a home on land her parents owned and raised their two sons where she still lives today. She has

been urged by her family to maybe downsize and find a home easier for her to maintain. But,

## Otter Sightings Around the Lake

ast week at the newsletter website committee planning meeting Diane Marlow mentioned seeing an otter in front of her home on little Simonton. I was puzzled about river otters on the lake. My husband used to trap them many years ago near the river but hadn't thought of them at the lake. Further checking found sightings on channels and big lake areas also. We recently visited the newly constructed otter habitat at Potawatomi Zoo with our grandkids. The little critters are fun to watch swimming above and under water, sunning, and entertaining. Check them out and enjoy if you see them on our lake! Many lake residents thought the

sightings might be muskrats. The muskrat is a much smaller rodent animal weighing 2-4 pounds length of 18-25 inches with an 8-11 inch tail.



Muskrats are reportedly wreaking havoc on seawalls around the lake this spring. Muskrats do structural damage to sea walls and landscaping while otters spend most of their time in the water.

As it turns out,

the DNR began reintroducing endangered otters from Louisiana to Indiana. As described in the DNR report their food source and habitat are a good fit for Simonton Lake. Beware of otters on the

lake!

The DNR reported otters were returning to Indiana after 100 years through a DNR reintroduction in Indiana and Illinois beginning 15 years ago. Otters were officially considered extinct in Indiana in 1942. but they probably were wiped out decades earlier. "Unregulated trapping and hunting was the main reason



otters disappeared due to no limits, regulations or laws according to the Department of Natural Resources. This combined with a loss of habitat to farmland and subdivisions led to the otter's demise in Indiana. The reintroduction has been highly successful with otters spotted in Porter and Lake Counties. **River otter facts:** 

- \* The river otter is 3-4 feet long and weighs 15-25 pounds.
- \* Its long tail is thicker close to its body and slims down to a point, making up one-third of the total body length. Rich, brown fur covers most of the animal.
- \* A tan underside is topped off with silver-gray fur on the throat. The long whiskers are used for finding underwater food.
- \* River otters feed on smaller, slowermoving animals that live in the water. Much of their diet consists of medium-sized fish, but they also enjoy crayfish and frogs.
- \* River otters make their homes around marshes, sloughs, ponds, lakes and streams. For protection, they tend to use natural structures such as logjams, overhanging rocks and abandoned shelters built by other animals.



O have gone smokeless. The city of Elkhart banned smoking in restaurants and bars and the state of Michigan has a state-wide smoking ban in their eating establishments. But Lakeshore and Pete's were in the middle. With no ban coming out of the Indiana State Legislature, Merle Anderson (Pete's) and Cam Snyder (Lakeshore) decided to make the change on their own.

Both restaurants look so much clearer, the food, always good, seems better. Merle even says folks have commented on the tastiness of items that have been on the menu forever. One evening after going smoke-free the kitchen took orders until 11:00 p.m.

Cam Snyder had already taken Chubby Trout non-smoking a year before the citywide smoking ban and saw a positive impact on business. He decided not to wait on the state any longer.

Other restaurants have done the same. The Hacienda Restaurant chain went smoke-free last year and reports that their business has increased. Beyond the cleaner air for patrons, the smoke-free air is a better work environment.

Smokers can still find a spot to smoke outside and both Cam and Merle hope they will continue to visit the establishments.

uack! Quack! You may be tempted to throw those cute waddling ducks a cracker, but think twice before you do. There is plenty of natural food for the ducks to feed on. Feeding them anything not naturally occurring in the watershed will put unnecessary amounts of nutrients (duck poop) in the lake. The excess nutrients (duck poop) act as excess fertilizer, which can result in algae blooms, not to mention increasing the chances of getting duck itch.

## **United We Stand**

A s Patrick Henry said in his last public speech in March 1799, "United we stand, divided we fall." Or possibly it might be more appropriate to say there is strength in numbers. However you say it, the potential for the Simonton Lake Area Home Owners Association to be an agent for positive change is directly proportional to the level of association membership by area residents.

The annual SLAHA spring public meeting was convened Monday, May 23rd. After the meeting as I was walking out of the door of the Sportsmen's Club, Bob Sampers said to me, "If more people had been at the meeting there would be a lot more people in the association." "Simonton Says" is hand delivered to seven-hundred homes in the area by dedicated volunteers, but the actual association membership is nowhere near that number. So being the economist that I am, I am reflecting on the meeting and doing a quick cost-benefit analysis of the many resident benefits presented at the meeting versus the annual cost of association membership.

**Do you enjoy the newsletter?** The first presentation at the meeting was by the literary staff of "Simonton Says." The newsletter is published six times a year, containing high interest, relevant information in an attractive, colorful format. The advertisers provide links to important services and often offer special discounts and coupons. In addition to the physical newsletter there is a web page where more timely information can be gathered and all past publications are archived. All of this is delivered to your door or to your computer. Now there's a pretty sweet deal.

**Do you use the lake as a recreational facility?** Do you host lake parties, especially during the holidays; do your relatives think your house is the only place to celebrate Independence Day? The membership and outreach committee was up next on the program. The Festival of Lights was extremely successful last year and is a go again for this year. The number of boats out on the lake to view the displays last year was impressive. The hog roast is a possible for a return in the fall to end this year's lake activities. Something new this year... SLAHA is going to partner with the Sportsman's Club to provide an even more spectacular fireworks display over the 4th of July. Better get those invitations in the mail.

Are you concerned about the security of your property or water safety while skiing and boating on the lake? The lake safety committee was next to present to the assembled crowd. We were introduced to Officer Casey Lehman, our Sheriff's Department liaison person and Officer Dustin Whitehead, our Conservation Officer in an attempt to enhance communications between the two agencies that handle most of the problems on or around the lake. There was also continued conversation about the pedestrian safety issue on Cassopolis Street and what could be done to improve the situation.

Is the quality of lake water, the aquatic habitat for fish, or ability to pilot your water craft between the two sides of the lake without running aground important to you? The lake quality committee presented the results of a \$35,000 comprehensive lake study implemented and partially paid for by SLAHA. The report generally suggests that the lake is in an improving condition. The construction and operation of the sewer system has had a significant positive impact on water quality. There are some problematic invasive plants growing in the lake, but their locations have been identified and volunteers are monitoring their growth in order to stave off disruptive advance. A list of procedures that residents could implement that would further improve the lake was also offered. And finally, a committee is being formed to pursue the dredging of an enhanced

35 x 2000 foot channel between the two sides of the lake. After it is completed, you will be able to review the full fiftypage report online at the association web site. Won't that make it much better to go between the two parts of the lake?

Do you have water in your basement or are you dealing with sea wall erosion due to the high lake level? It seems that after nineteen years the weir may be moving forward. It appears that the county has an agreement with the landowner regarding right-of-way access for construction of the weir. If things fall into place the way they should, the weir could be constructed this winter and Simonton Lake will finally have a much needed water control device that will maintain a consistent lake level and reduce or eliminate many of the high water issues. How can you put a price on that?

This is just the tip of SLAHA meeting iceberg. There were many other programs discussed to enhance the quality of life on the lake for all residents. It seems pretty clear to me that \$30 annual membership fee would have to be one of the best values when you consider the many benefits derived. Another important point is that as the membership field increases, the larger the financial base becomes and even more important projects can be undertaken. All you have to do is locate that membership application in this newsletter, fill it out, and send it in with your check and you too can become a member of a dynamic organization whose only mission is to improve the quality of life for lake residents. It just kind of makes you feel good doesn't it?

#### **Neutralizing Skunk Odor**

When spring arrives so does our favorite friend the skunk. There is no doubt of that particular odor. And there is nothing like the scent of your dog when that dog has had the unfortunate meeting with a neighborhood skunk.


Here is some advice from Purdue University School of Agriculture:

A skunk's odor on pets, clothing, under buildings, etc., may be neutralized by the liberal application of a veterinary use deodorizer. Vinegar, tomato juice, or a weak solution of household ammonia can help remove the odor from clothing. Use lime to deodorize the soil. A few drops of oil of wintergreen on pieces of corrugated cardboard or cotton balls also helps mask the offensive odor. A mixture of 32 ounces (1 quart) of 3% hydrogen peroxide, ¼ cup baking soda, and 1 teaspoon of liquid soap (ex. Dawn dish detergent, etc.) will neutralize scent when applied to the source of the odor.



month we visit **Fish Lake** which is bound by County Road 34 to the north, County Road 36 to the south, State Road 13 to the West and East County Line Road to the east. It is located in Clinton Township where the largest and only metropolis is Millersburg.

This lake is easy to find because it's right across the street from the home of the Miller family of Elkhart County. Just find a mailbox that has the name Miller written on it, and look across the street.

Your best view of Fish Lake is from the public access which is on County Road 34 just east of State Road 13. Next to the public landing you will see several fishing boats that are turned upside down. Those row boats are owned by nearby residents, you know, the Millers. You will also see a tremendous view of untouched land and seemingly untouched water.

You may launch your boat from the public site and fish this beautiful "no wake" lake. Once on the water, when you have found "your spot", cast your line so you can enjoy the serenity of this laidback scenic area with no sound of speedboats or wave runners.

The countryside is not filled with automobiles, trucks and motorcycles.


No, around Fish Lake you see bicycles, horse-drawn buggies and wagons. The only noise you will hear is from the occasional vehicle that may travel one of the county roads.




