



Boating is fun, relaxing, entertaining and ... a responsibility.

very person or family with a boat or personal watercraft (PWC) should either have a copy of **The Handbook! Of Indiana Boating Laws & Responsibilities** or be able to access the website (www.boat-ed.com) to ensure proper use of this summer enjoyment. Since water vessels will soon be circling the lake again, this newsletter edition is a good time to refresh us on some of the boating rules.

Before going out on the lake:

1. A certificate of registration is required to operate a vessel if motorized.

- The registration is obtained through the BMV
- The certificate must be on board the boat or PWC
- The watercraft must be properly numbered, and the numbers and excise tax decals must be displayed on both sides of the bow
- Transferring ownership of a boat, etc., one no longer owns should be reported within 15 days, and a buyer should have the registration transferred to his name within 31 days

2. An individual planning to operate a boat must hold a valid driver's license. An individual who is at least 15 years old who doesn't have a valid license but has successfully completed an approved DNR educational course may also operate a watercraft. No one under 15 years old may legally operate a motorboat greater than 10 horsepower or a PWC.

3. Certain equipment must be on board boats.

- One wearable personal flotation device (PFD) per person on board the watercraft is required
- Vessels 16' or longer must also have a throwable PFD on board
- All persons being towed must wear a PFD – ski belts not approved
- Fire extinguishers are required on most boats check the handbook or website for exceptions

4. Navigation lights must be used during the following conditions:

- Between sunset and sunrise
- During restricted visibility, i.e., fog, heavy rain

If you have met all of the above criteria relating to your watercraft, it is time to get on the water.



Good News!!

This winter the Environment Committee submitted for LARE grants from the Indiana DNR. We applied for three different grants: the Aquatic Vegetation Project, the Eco Zone Project, and the Sediment Removal Project. We have received information on each of these projects.

The <u>Aquatic Vegetation Project</u> is probably not going to happen on Simonton. While we had great news that Simonton Lake has 1% invasive weeds (EMF) from our lake study, we most likely will not receive any funding. Other Indiana lakes have more severe problems.

The **Eco Zone Project** remains a possibility for our lake. What we need right now is a group of people to work on laying out a workable plan.

Finally, we received information this week that we are "officially approved" to develop a plan for sediment removal so that we can determine costs for the project. Again, this is exciting news for the <u>Sediment Removal</u> <u>Project</u>! We are looking for someone to head up this project.

Anyone interested in any or all of these projects, a meeting of the Environment Committee will be held Monday, May 7 at 7:00 at Vaughn Nickell's home. ■







The Leprechaun Leap - 2012

ELKHART — Even the grass was green for Froggy radio's seventh annual Leprechaun Leap. Many of this year's particpants wore T-shirts and sunglasses, as the unseasonably warm weather brought spectators out in droves for the United Cancer Services of Elkhart County benefit.

Mark McGill, Froggy

radio personality, and Peter Norton, Director of United Cancer. estimated there would be nearly 1,000 people in attendance by the 2 p.m. leap into Simonton Lake. "Anytime you can draw 900 to 1,000 people, it's a major event," Norton said, referring to the event's





standing in the Elkhart area.

First time leapers Tim Lang and Michelle Britton, friends from Brown Mackie College in South Bend, were enjoying their first time at the event. "It's a good time for a good cause," Lang said. "It's nice to see everybody showing up."

Lang was dressed as a leprechaun, while his cohort wore a wedding dress. Britton had agreed that if her friends helped her meet her fundraising goal, she would jump into the lake.

"I bought this wedding dress because I expect to get married at some point in the future. But right now there are women with cancer who may never see their wedding," Britton said.

McGill expected the fundraiser to bring in \$30,000 for United Cancer Services, though the exact amount will not be known until Monday or Tuesday.

While the sound of the local rock band Gypsy Red mingled in the breeze with the smell of food and beer donated by Pete's Simonton Lake Tavern, the crowd gathered near the dock. Just before 2 p.m., Norton climbed onto a table and addressed the gathering before the leaping began. "Thanks for caring about your neighbors with cancer," he said, before the crowd's anticipation of the leap

drowned him out. The team of 10 from Froggy were then led onto the dock, and with a collective scream, they jumped into the deceptively icy water, to cool off from the beautiful day they were lucky enough to receive. ■







Leona Skinner, Queen of Little Simonton

A fter living on Little Simonton for 54 years, Leona Skinner definitely is the little lake's Queen! Leona celebrated her 90th birthday March 31 with her family and friends at a party held at New Creation Fellowship. She has lived in the same home on the lake since 1958. Leona was born in 1922, in Leiters Ford, Indiana then later moving to Richland Center. Leona graduated from

Leiters Ford High School. Leona married Marion Skinner moving again to another closeby town, Bruce Lake Station. Marion Skinner worked for his father at C and M Construction which was run by Bob



Cowles. At this time around 1958, there was to be a big job near Kalamazoo which brought the Skinners to want to live closer. Leona was driving around looking for a desirable spot and found a home which was located in a much undeveloped area on a little lake called Si-

monton. They bought the house and moved in shortly after. When the Skinners moved to Simonton Lake, there were only four other homes on the little lake and the channels had already been dug. At that time and for several years, there was little development on the channels with most of the homes beginning to be built in the late 60's. It was mostly sand piles.

Stan Skinner, Leona's son, remembers in the 1960's helping his dad operate machinery dredging out the channels again. Bob Cowles, Marion's boss, dredged most of those channels.

> Because of the prevailing southwest winds bringing wind and waves bearing sand, the channels had gotten shallow and needed clearing of sand again. At that time, there was a deep dredged channel that ran on the east side of the lake along the shore allowing easier travel. If you are familiar with this area, you know that a deeper channel still exists on the southeast side of

the little lake but not the northeast side.

Leona has seen changes around her home such as the smaller channel dredged to the east of hers and homes have been built in recently. This brought her neighbors much closer. Stan and Linda moved into the same home while an addition was built for Leona to live on her own. Her husband, Marion, died nine years ago.

Can you believe that Leona delivered the Elkhart Truth (bundle route) for 40 years just retiring three years ago? Leona has delivered the bundles all over Elkhart County and southern Michigan. She would usually drive 70 miles daily. When the Elkhart Truth switched to a morning newspaper, it really changed her life! Leona can obviously tell stories of weather and experiences during her deliveries over those years!

Leona still enjoys many interests. Her children Stan and her daughter, Nyla, live in the area as well as her grandchildren. She has always enjoyed gardening along with the canning and cooking that comes with it. She plans to continue the garden until it is no longer physically possible to maintain. Leona enjoys reading, especially the Bible. Watching the birds of all kinds around their feeders brings a lot of joy to Leona. The Simonton Lake community wishes Leona a Happy 90th Birthday! Now that Leona is retired, she is able to enjoy the many things that brought her to Simonton Lake 54 years ago: nature, quiet waters, and her home in the woods.

Sixty-eight Years on the Lake



ucky you if you were the child of Frieda Baskerville. Pies, cakes and cookies would be waiting for you everyday after school. Frieda is 93 years old, moving to her home on North Shore Drive in 1944. She and her husband John raised three children at the lake in their 60 years of marriage.

Frieda moved to an uncle's in Elkhart Co. from Noble Co. when she was 20 years old for a job at Barger Box. There she met John and worked for 40 hours a week for \$10.00 (not an hour...a week!) with 10 cents deducted for Social Security.

In her 68 years on the lake Frieda has seen a lot of changes. At one time the closest stop light was at Bristol and Cassopolis St. She remembers willow trees along the shoreline all the way around the lake and only a few fishing boats before she saw the first boat with a motor. In the summer there were always children swimming from morning to night off anchored floating rafts. There were ice skaters on the lake all day in the winter. Frieda notes there were not as many "distractions" as today for kids. With a lot

less traffic on North Shore there were always lots of children on bikes. At that time North Shore had no outlet, ending at Dutton St. Her husband John at one time owned a bar near Cassopolis St. and Lake Drive called Harold's. She also re-





members a Conservation Club near Lake Drive.

Mrs. Baskerville has bloomed where she was planted and never wanted to leave the lake. In November 2011 Frieda flew to Jackson Hole, Wyoming with her daughter Deb to visit her grand daughter. After seeing the Grand Tetons and a thrilling plane ride she was happy to get back to her home on Simonton Lake, a place we all love. ■

Central Time Versus Eastern Time



Life on the Lake



Whose Lake is it Anyway?

The term Michiana fits this lake. Indiana Lake is located mostly in Michigan and partly in Indiana, however, it is considered an Elkhart County Lake.....sometimes... an Indiana Lake...... sometimesand never considered a Michigan lake. Since most of it is in Michigan maybe it should be called Lake Michigan.....No, wait, there is already one of those.

Some listings of lakes in Indiana list Indiana Lake, many do not. Some listings of Elkhart County Lakes list Indiana Lake most do not. No listings I could find in Michigan or Cass County claim this treasure as their lake.

Tri Lakes are Baldwin, Indiana and Long. These three were for years the lakes of choice for many Elkhart residents to rent cottages. One of the hottest features of the area was Hollywood Shores, owned by Elkhart's Julius Decio, Hollywood Shores was located between Indiana Lake and Baldwin Lake. It was a lively community where people could rent cottages, rent boats or go for a swim.

Today, Wayne Street runs through the Hollywood Shores area which is now, instead of cottages and boat rentals, homes, many homes.

To travel from Simonton Lake to Indiana Lake, take CR 4 east to CR 17. Take CR 17 north to Wayne Street. Turn right unto Wayne and continue east. You soon will be in "Hollywood Shores". Look to your right and you see Indiana Lake. You can take your first right which is Indiana Lake Drive which will take you along the east side of the lake. As you continue south, you re-enter the state of Indi-

ana. After you pass a road named Central, continue south and you will drive to

Sunset Blvd. Turn right on Sunset and go south to Church Road. Take a right and you will meet Indiana Lake Road. Turn left and take Indiana Lake Road to CR 2. From here, you can turn right on CR 2 which will take you to Cornwall Road where you can turn right to follow the west side of the lake. Cornwall becomes a cul-de-sac, so turn around and go back to CR 2. Turn right on CR 2 and you are headed back home.


You can always do what many of our families did on Sunday afternoons years ago; take CR 19 north to CR 2. Take a right on CR 2 and continue east to CR




23. Take a left on CR 23 and continue north. You are now on Sunset Blvd. Continue North and look to your left, that's Indiana Lake. Continue past Wayne Street and you see Baldwin Lake on your left; Long Lake is on your right. There were many good times on the Tri Lakes, swimming, fishing, and relaxing. Now residents still have good times on these three lakes, swimming, fishing, and relaxing.

Hollywood Shores and Sunset Blvd., a little piece of southern California right here, just east of more heaven on earth, your own Simonton Lake.

To my horror, stuck under the ramp was what had to be the oldest, biggest, ugliest, most frightening snapping turtle we had ever seen. Not even in a zoo, much less in our back yard. His shell extended beyond one side of the ramp to the other. Now remember this ramp was 2 feet wide. His head, what

Over decades we've watched many leatherback turtles sunning themselves while floating on top of weeds in the channels and along the shoreline across from us. During my younger years and when our boys were little we caught and released painted turtles. They used to be in abundance out front of their grandma's house across from the boat landing and climbing up on limbs in several areas. Hanging on a wall in our home is a "bigger than a dinner plate more like a platter size" shell from a snapper that had been recently hit by a boat. We gave it to a neighbor. He cleaned it and prepared some might tasty turtle soup. But never have we seen anything the size of this beast. And beastly it was!

One spring while Jon was in the water putting in our sprinkling pump, he turned and noticed something that had him out of the water and running up to the house to find me so that I could see can I say about his head, other than when it reached up and looked at us, it seemed to be the size of a supersized grapefruit or small basketball. His neck could have easily reached out and taken Jon's hand or foot. If it had gotten a hold of any part of him – let's just say, I can only imagine the trauma. I've heard that when they bite, they hang on for life and

even after life has been taken from them, it's a struggle to get them to let go.

There were other witnesses. We called the Roses and they hurried down. John R. wanted to bring his gun, but Stephanie discouraged him. Part of me wishes he had, cuz we could have fed the neighborhood for a week from the meat that would have been claimed. And we would have had a trophy shell that would amaze visitors to any "hall of fame" museum. But instead, we honored the old relic and raised the ramp and sent him on his way to be feared and marveled at for future sightings. Word to the wise, BEWARE!

NATURALLY, SINCE WRITING THIS ARTILCE, I CAN'T FIND MY TURTLE PIC-TURES. !!!! and without them, it's like seeing Big Foot or a UFO but not having any proof. ■

That doesn't seem like a particularly realistic goal but I do think it is worth a try.

Mark your calendar for next year be-

cause Presidents' Weekend is the perfect time to beat the winter blahs with a jaunt to the "Windy City." Chicago's Restaurant Week conveniently coincides with a national holiday at what is arguably the most dreadful part of winter. Organized by the Chicago **Convention & Tourism** Bureau, Restaurant Week gives local foodies and visitors an op-

portunity to enjoy established menus with multiple courses from more than 200 participating restaurants at two prices \$33/\$44 for dinner.

During our excursion our first dinner was at 312 Chicago, a restaurant on LaSalle Street in the heart of the financial district. This eatery had good reviews but it was also conveniently located around the corner from the Cadillac Palace where we had tickets to Rodgers and Hammerstein's South Pacific. Carole had Rigatoni Bolognese, with a meat sauce which contained ground beef, veal, pork, red wine, and plum tomatoes. I chose the pan-seared tilapia on braised lentils, spinach, cipollini onions, and thyme lemon oil. Carole was pleased with hers, mine was probably the best tilapia I had ever eaten. For desert Carole chose a flour-



less chocolate cake and I had Banana chocolate bread pudding. Again I would have to say I was the winner! For our second evening we chose Mc-Cormick and Schmick's on Wacker Drive. We wouldn't normally


chain restaurant but Terry Shewmaker raves about the restaurant in Indianapolis and the Chicago location is well situated on the Chicago River. We thought we would give it a try. Carole wasn't up



for a second multi course meal so she chose a pecan encrusted tilapia and I had a pan-seared walleye on roasted red potatoes, mushrooms and truffles sauce. As good as the tilapia was the night before, this was even better. Carole managed to save enough room to help me with my excellent key lime pie with fresh whipped cream.

Not everyone enjoys paying the tolls, dealing with parking, dodging taxis while driving in Chicago, so we chose to take the South Shore. I find this to be your best option as quite frankly a car is a liability in the city. If you choose to take the train, drive to the Carroll Street Station in Michigan City where there is ample free parking and purchase the round trip senior citizen ticket to Randolph Street Station for \$9.00, or less than half the fee to park your car one night at a hotel. For another \$5.75 you can get a one day unlimited use CTA fare card. Two people with fare cards can travel all day anywhere in the city for less than the price of one taxi ride in the downtown area.

When the lake is frozen and there is little happening in the area, nothing is more fun than taking a trip and enjoying new restaurants. And if you can also throw in one of the nation's largest auto shows, well it just doesn't get any better than that.



What Stories Can an **Old Abstract Tell?**

he Simonton Lake Newsletter committee was sitting and discussing possible stories we could do for future issues one evening and I mentioned how interesting old, fat abstracts are that many of us have filed away somewhere. When records began to be microfilmed or kept electronically, the old abstracts were given to the land owners. Some newer land owners may not have had the chance to acquire theirs. I have had an oppor-

tunity to read and study several around the lake...quite interesting and certainly each one carries its own history. Maria Hopman on North Shore volunteered to let me study hers and, YES, a new story to tell! Of course, most of the abstracts of this area begin with our area's founder, Samuel Simonton.

Maria's abstract begins with Samuel Simonton purchasing the land in 1832, when Andrew Jackson was president. Samuel was an early merchant in the village of Elkhart. He had four sons, Abner,

David, John, and Samuel and three daughters Eliza Tibbetts, Elizabeth Beardsley and Hannah Jackson. Samuel Sr. died in 1850, and willed his children

his land. In 1877, the Simonton children sold the land to Harry Winegar and William Thompson. (This was a large section of land but I was not able to determine the size and exact location.) William Thompson took the land north of the lake and Harry Winegar took the remaining. Thompson's land became a farm. The family home still remains on the east side of Cassopolis Street north of the lake. In 1900, William gave most of his land to his children, Ulysses Grant Thompson, Elmer Thompson and Jennie



Bell. The stipulation was that they give one third of their crops and fruit from the land to their parents as long as they live. In 1924, the children sold off land

and in 1926, Elmer Thompson subdivided some of the remaining land and formed "Johnson's Subdivision at Simonton Lake". (See map) The land that Maria lives on now was not sold until 1945, and purchased by Jessie Lamb. (Maria's lot is #24) The lot remained part of a larger piece of land until 1964, when it was sold to Willard

and Sharon Miller when the house that Maria lives in now was built. Elmer Thompson died in 1964. When looking at the plans for the subdivision, much of the north and east part of the lake was within this subdivision. It even had plans for a park which to my knowledge, I have never found evidence that one existed.

So, what did we learn from another Simonton Lake abstract? It was interesting to me that the Simonton family owned much of the land at least on the north section of the lake until the late 1800's. When sold to the Thompson family, it then remained in their family as late as in the mid 1900's. The development of much of Osolo Township really did not take hold until the late 1800's. In 1881, the first Osolo post office was located along Adamsville Road with Alphonse Bugsbee the postmaster. The first school house was in a log cabin, Newell School, located on the northeast corner of County Road 6 and 9. However, most of the rest of the township schools were not built until the later years of the 1880's and 90's.

If any of this is of interest to you, why not do some Spring cleaning in your files, and bring out the old Abstract of your land (if you have one) and see what you might find? It might prove to be an interesting evening's read. And, if you want to share, give us a call!!

Larry graduated from Elkhart High School in 1961 and attended IUSB and retired as a purchasing manager for


