

ECOZONE? WHAT'S AN ECOZONE?

ast year a water quality study was done by the state for Simonton

Lake. The results were good. Our lake is doing ok. However, some suggestions were made to continue this status.

One suggestion was the establishment of an **ecozone**. The state has come up with the name "**Ecozone**" to designate an area where no motorized water craft go. You can still fish the area, use an electric trolling motor, canoe or kayak. You cannot anchor. But, no ski boats, motorized fishing boats, no jet skis or wave runners. Buoys would mark the ecozone. Folks who live near an ecozone are allowed to use a motorized boat to get out to use their lake.

Lake Syracuse and Lake Wawasee were the first lakes to have an Ecozone back in 2002 just two years after the Ecozone law was passed. Actually Lake Wawasee, the largest natural lake in Indiana, has several ecozones. Tippecanoe and Manitou have areas as well.

Ecozones include wetlands, marshes and shallow areas. Areas like these not only provide a habitat for fish and wildlife but also filter nutrients and sediments that hurt water quality and they recharge groundwater. One

area lake with an ecozone noted that the area acted as self-sustaining fish nursery.

Lakes that do not protect these areas find their water quality in danger as at

Lake Tippecanoe in Kosciusko County. There the wetlands areas and plants had all but disappeared and had to be re-established in order to save the lake. Some lakes in Indiana where all the cattails and lily pads had completely disappeared had to actually bring in the plants and put them back in their lake one at a time using lake residents as volunteers. Why would they do this? To keep their lake from dying.

Scientists tell us without human beings on lakes the disappearance of these essential features might never happen. But, when humans collide with a lake ecosystem there can be trouble.

The biggest culprit in the destruction of wetlands, marshes and shallow areas is motorized watercraft. Boat motors disturb the bottom, cut up plants and create wakes that throw sediment onto wetland plants making it difficult or im-

possible to grow. Bedding areas for fish are disturbed.

Let me be clear that the state cannot and will not force the residents of a lake to establish an ecozone. They will only allow a lake to do this if the residents are in favor.

And, if we would establish an ecozone, we want to find a way to do it and not impact our motor boat activities that many of us enjoy.

If we would do this where would we establish an Ecozone?

The leading suggestion has been the inlet leading to Lily Creek. It's a small area, would still allow us room to ski and run our boats. And, there are no homes in the shoreline of this area so no one would have their frontage in the zone.

Could it be elsewhere? Sure. We'd like to hear your thoughts. Should we have an ecozone at all? We'd like your opinion. Would you like to be on the ecozone committee? Contact Amy Matherly at 262-4773 or Diane Marlow at 262-2262.

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
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Elvis Sighting


Along with Elvis and Tom

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Dining Al Fresco

ne of my most cherished memories of growing up on a farm is harvest time. It was during the 1940's and farming was a very labor intensive business. Much like the Amish do today, farm families would gather together and help each other harvest the crops. Work would begin early in the morning while the temperature was still relatively cool. The men would begin working in the fields and the women would start preparing the noon feast.

Being too young to work in the fields, I was left to help the women. Sawhorses were set up and covered with long boards under towering pine trees that shaded the house. White table clothes covered the roughhewn boards which held heaping serving dishes of mashed potatoes, fried chicken, green beans, and freshly baked bread and fruit pies. Large sweating pitchers of ice cold home-made lemonade provided relief from the heat of the day.



At the stroke of high noon the men would appear in their sweaty blue, cotton work shirts and bib overalls and collapse on the ground against the trees. The women would fix their husband a heaping plate of food and the conversa-

tion would begin that would last for about an hour and a half, at which time the men returned to the fields and the women would erase all evidence that a significant social event had occurred.

The term "al fresco" comes from the

Italian language and means outside in the cool, which pretty much sums up my experiences on the farm. Houses and particularly kitchens with wood cook stoves were very hot and not a good place for field hands to relax on a hot summer's day. Having been imprinted by these experiences, one of my most anticipated summer activities is eating a tasty meal outside by the lake, closely followed by sitting on a patio at a local restaurant with friends drinking a tall cold draught beer. People who live along the Mediterranean seem to have a proclivity for outside dining proba-

COMMUNITY UPDATE

Your Township Trustee And What He Can Do For You

s residents of Simonton Lake we are aware of the many tiers of governmental offices which represent us – national, state, district, county. Closer to home, we have an officer who advocates for our township and the people in it. His title is Township Trustee.

Duties of the trustee include the following:

- Maintain any records for the township. These records are open for public inspection.
- Receive and pay out township funds (example is property taxes)
- · File township reports
- Attend all meetings of the township executive body (advisory board members are Dick Griffen, Prudy Holtzhausen and Doug Thornton)
- Provide fire protection. The Osolo
 Township Trustee contracts with the
 fire station on Buddy Street and
 EMS on County Road 4 rather than
 try to manage the departments
 himself. Fire and ambulance
 equipment is purchased through
 the township trustee's budget, and
 he is involved in the process of cap ital expenditure purchases.
- Administer assistance to the poor in the township. In general, we can count on our trustee to assist with meeting basic needs such as clothing, food, household supplies, medical assistance, shelter and utilities. Other services include burials and transportation to seek employment. When someone is in need of help, the township trustee's office is the place to start. Referrals are made

from there. Elkhart County has guidelines for assisting the poor, and those rules are followed in the Osolo office. 3% of the township trustee's budget is for poor relief. It should also be

noted that this duty is managed closely because the trustee is personally liable for all funds administered to these people.



The term of office is four years and begins on January 1st after the general election. **Ben Russo** is the current Osolo Township Trustee, and his office is located at:

Mr. Russo has held the office since

Maplewood Lane Saw Many Owners in Early Days

found another story to tell and this is of Lot 11, Maplewood, Simonton Lake. Bernie Swinehart contacted me about sharing her abstract. As stated before, old abstracts were given to land owners by banks many years ago when paper abstracts became obsolete and the new microfilmed abstracts re-

placed them. Perhaps now, that process has even been replaced. I mentioned in previous articles, there is always a story when reading through these interesting pages of time.

Bernie's abstract's last date was dated August, 1966 and that is when Phillip and Anna Leonard purchased the home on Maplewood from Jack and Mary English. Anna is Bernie's given name. Bernie has lived in her home since 1966. She retired from CTS having worked there 45 years. She cannot imagine living any other place and still loves living on the lake. Bernie grew up, on and around Simonton Lake.

My first impression when reading this abstract was that this land has had many owners, many more

than most that I have seen when studying old abstracts. Often this land on Maplewood was the center of disputes in court. This all made for quite an interesting story:

In 1846, when the first recording of this land was written in the abstract, a public auction of land was held. Almost

350 acres of land was being auctioned around the lake. Nathan Newell bought 93 acres for \$372 at \$4 an acre. This was Lot 1 which was the Maplewood area. Lot 2 was purchased by Salmon Johnson which was 245 acres and mostly lay north of the lake. (You may remember this from my last story.)

Nathan died without a will in 1900. He had a son 14 years of age as his only heir. For two years a series of long legal court proceedings followed. Many family members decided that they would like part of young Nathaniel's land. The court decided that each of the family plaintiffs in the case would get some of the property. Mary Newell Kahler had been appointed his legal guardian until he was 21. It was during this time that she gave some of the land to relatives


failure to make the land contract payments. Mr. Replogle ended up as owner of the land again. The second time Replogle's sold the land in 1942, was to George Gothiea. Once again, the land changed hands in 1947, to Maurice Longenecker for \$1,500. In 1948, Jack and Mary English purchased the home and it remained with them until 1966 when the Leonard's bought the home.

One could only speculate if the reason for the early lawsuits was for the inheritance value as I doubt there were any dwellings on the property at that time. Following in the 30's and 40's, one could guess that the dwelling was a small cabin used for recreation and not a permanent home. Bernie pointed out the section of her home that was the oldest part of what she referred to as the cabin area.



which was in Nathaniel's name. Additional law suits followed over ownership but Arthur and Charlotte Replogle ended up with Lot 11 by 1923. They were related to the Newell family. In 1936, they sold lot 11 of the Silver Beach subdivision of Maplewood to Mr. Leroy Gay but by 1937, the land was back in court by

Thanks again to Bernie for sharing the story of her home and land with us. I hope you are finding these stories interesting. As we circle the lake and do a little digging in old documents, there is always a new story to be found.

What does the SLAHA do for you?

hat is the benefit of having a Homeowner's Association on Simonton Lake? Here are just a few of the accomplishments:

- A \$35,000 Indiana LARE Grant (DNR) was secured for a "Diagnostic Study" in 2010. The SLAHA paid a portion additionally for the study. This grant was strategic in order to set the benchmark for what was needed to improve the lake's water quality for the future.
- A \$7,500 Indiana LARE Grant was secured this year for planning for sediment removal. It was secured for enhancement of our water quality which was born from the Diagnostic Study. We will submit an application for a grant for this project this fall which could amount upwards of \$300,000. The Ecozone project is also in the planning stages and was inspired by the original study. The Ecozone committee will meet August 15 at the Sportsmen's Club.
- Buoys for the lake were purchased, maintained and placed yearly.
- SLAHA works to support the Simonton

Lake Sportsman Club with the July 4th fireworks display.

- The "Simonton Says Newsletter", a quality newsletter, is published and distributed to all residents of the area 6 times a year.
- The Simonton Lake Area Homeowner's Association's website is maintained and updated regularly also storing and making available all of the past newsletters.
- Recycling was initiated because of interest of our residents and started with Borden.
- The Lake Safety committee has provided residents a source to refer any potential hazards, resident concerns of safety, etc. This committee does have a communication relationship with the Elkhart County Sheriff's Department and the DNR but does not work with or give recommendations to either.
- The Membership and Outreach Committee is responsible for membership. works with distribution of newsletters and provides social opportunities on the lake such as the Hog Roast, past Boat Parades, etc.
- The Lake Safety Committee has posted Neighborhood Watch signs around the lake, lake safety signage was posted at the landing, a light was installed also at

the landing, and the committee has taken on the task of cleaning up the landing. The Public Landing is owned by the state of Indiana and theoretically maintained by the state, however, the SLAHA has taken on the responsibility of keeping it one step safer and cleaner for our residents and users.

- Several open meetings have been called since our first year of SLAHA. Some are annual meetings of the Association, others have been organized for specific concerns of our residents. SLAHA attempts to provide an open forum in all meetings, inviting anyone who may be able to provide information to better facilitate issues. SLAHA's philosophy is that our work is conducted through the committee structure and all members are encouraged to participate in those committees.
- The "weir" project which goes back nearly 20 years is still being planned and the SLAHA continues to attempt to keep it alive. The advantage that Simonton Lake has now in getting this project to move forward is that <u>SLAHA</u> now EXISTS! Having an organized body behind this project is a real plus. SLAHA still remains hopeful that the weir will be built sometime soon.

've got a "rainy day list".

Now laundry, washing dishes, the day-to-day jobs get done rain or shine. But painting, cleaning closets and drawersthese things are rainy day jobs.




Then one morning when I was walking across the kitchen in my socks I stuck, not permanently, but briefly, to a spot in the kitchen.

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There Is Nothing Square about Round Lake


n our quest of the "Lakes of Elkhart County", this month we visit Round Lake. Round Lake can be found in a rectangle sided by C R 2 to the north, County Road 104 to the south, C R 21 West and CR 23 to the east.

Round is actually more of an *elliptic paraboloid* than a *circle* because of the vertical cross sections. Occasionally I get sloppy and refer to this configuration merely as a *paraboloid* which is unfair because you may take my description as a *hyperbolic paraboloid* or one that may cause a second look using more coefficients.

Round Lake falls into an ellipse and is a part of a polygon of several small bodies of water all lying in a plane that seems to form a googolgon of many bodies of water within probably more of what you would want described as a hecatonicosachoron than say a chiliagon or an optical enneagon. At least, that's the view I got. You may see it differently, especially if you view it from an aircraft.

If you want to fish this lake, you have to jump a fence and will be on private property. There is no public access; however you get a great view of the *quadric cylinder* from County Road 2. You may also view the Tri-Lakes that form a *triangle* north and west of *Round* since you are in the area.

Next time we will visit Wolf Lake. Until then.....enjoy YOUR Lake the best of them all, Simonton. ■

Simonton Lake Ski Clubs

e all love the lake and consider it a privilege to be able to enjoy its beauty, but can you imagine what it must have been like to be a kid living and growing up in this idyllic setting? It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out the if you grow up around water you are going to be very fit and pretty darn good at water sports. In previous editions we have featured the skiing exploits of pioneers like Chet Matherly and Peanut Macowitz, along with them the next generation of Dick Martin and Dan Hardwick, but arguably the epitome of lake skiing occurred between 1972 and 1980. A lot of things came together during that time to help elevate water skiing to nearly a professional level.

The formation of a ski club was the vision of Billy Hanna and Brad Brubaker who by June of 1972 had enlisted the help of John Nusbaum and Rich

ski jump. Building a competition ski jump by a group of teenagers was no small undertaking. As construction and organization proceeded other lake youth began to join the club. One of those new members, Kathy Nickell, came up with a name for the club, Sundance Ski Club.


The first show for the club was performed on August 25, 1972.

Some interesting background information about the club is that most of them learned to ski behind outboard fishing boats. John Nusbaum owned the first inboard boat on the lake. Ski boat technology was progression at the appropriate time to enhance the performance of the club.

As time passed, members would drift away and new members would be added. New tricks would be developed

Along with the name change came a more intense focus by the members. The shows became more elaborate, practice took more time, and the financial burden of putting on two major shows a summer became greater. A



show contained somewhere between ten and fifteen tricks and were designed to last between 45 and 60 minutes. Shows

required many participants. Of course there were usually about 15 skiers, boat operators and spotters, follow up boats to pick up dropped skis, announcers, and people to organize the equipment. A typical show required about 30 people to make it run smoothly.

The show site was on the northeast part of the big lake as it narrows to the channel to the little lake. This is where the ski jump was situated. Along with the original jump a slalom course was added. Skiers designed bright colored matching costumes. There was even a skiing dog," Bubba Nickell" as well as several other dogs. The boat technology continued to advance using more powerful V8 en-

gines which were needed to pull as many as 5 skiers at a time. Some of the more unique acts the club performed were the 5-man pyramid, a skier on human skis, the boat doing a 360 degree turn while pulling a skier, a 3-man barefoot pyramid, a skier doing a 360 degree spin off the jump, a barefoot start off of the jump and slalom expeditions.



ecently I ran across a list compiled by the Indiana Office of Tourism Development of the top 10 ice cream shops in the state. (URL below) What caught my attention was that four of the ten shops are located in Elkhart County. This is an important point as cute or just weird may have trumped flavor in the survey. However, this article was my inspiration piece to strike out and sample as many kinds of ice cream at as many shops as possible, compile a regional survey and report back to residents about which businesses deserve their attention.

If you are not an ice cream addict you may not be aware of a sweeping change occurring in the ice cream industry, now read this carefully.....self-serve, soft-serve sold by the ounce. When you enter one of these establishments you pick up a cardboard tub, move to where the crowd is huddled around a wall of dispensers offering various flavors of soft-serve ice cream. You may mix as many flavors as you wish and pile on as much as you like, but remember you are paying by the ounce. But this experience isn't over yet; before you reach the scales, you must run the toppings gauntlet where every kind of nut, candy piece, cookie crumble, and syrup flavor is available. This has to be one of the fastest



peanut butter, strawberries, vanilla beans and even bits of cheesecake. Each flavor is either low fat or fat free, and all of the yogurts contain the live and active yogurt cultures that are so good for your stomach. I kind of like to

dipped ice cream in a dish in the form of a sundae or maybe a "Funky Monkey." This is the new specialty at the <u>Olympia</u> in Goshen. Yes, they have more to offer than the best candy turtles in the world. If you haven't been there you have missed a truly classic "soda fountain." But back to the "Funky Monkey," rich vanilla ice cream, sliced banana, peanut butter sauce (my new favorite), hot fudge, and top with chopped pecans from the turtles.

One area shop that is both unique and serves very tasty ice cream is Rocket Science located in Coppes Commons, the former Coppes cabinet factory in Nappanee. As you watch, a Rocket Science employee will add, and then mix the ingredients in a stainless steel bowl. The concoction contains a basic ice cream mix, various syrups, fresh fruit, candy pieces, or cookie crumbles. Then the bowl with the customer's selection is placed under a nozzle where liquid nitrogen is dispensed. As the worker mixes the concoction vigorously, there is sputtering, fizzing and pretty soon a white cloud of vaporized nitrogen rolls across the countertop and envelops the worker and the mixing bowl. It looked very much like a scene from the movie "Back to the Future." At Rocket Science you can enjoy a tasty ice cream creation and a few minutes of theater all for one price.

I have arguably saved the best for last. Finishing in first place on the Indiana Office of Tourism and certainly a strong contender on my list is another one of those places that just makes you scratch your head and ask how does this place do

this much business. I'm talking about <u>The Chief</u>. If we're looking for a movie that would typify the Chief it would be "Happy Days." The Chief opened in 1962 on the southwest corner of West Lincoln Avenue and Chicago Avenue in Goshen and it doesn't appear to have changed since that time. The parking lot is still unpaved, but that's OK because the lines are so long there's no room to park if you wanted. Another feature characteristic of the past, the Chief is only open in the summer. What makes this place so successful? They just sell really good ice cream at a really good price. There are fourteen flavors of a creamy dense consistency that seems more like gelato than traditional ice cream, but the result is sensational.

It seems that the southern half of the county is where you'll find the best ice cream action and I didn't even mention <u>South Side Soda Shop</u>. Throw the bikes in the back of the wagon and head to Goshen for a ride on the Pumpkin Vine and finish with a tasty ice cream treat at any one of a number of great ice cream shops.



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
