

t's a cold gray January day as I write this installment of Life on the Lake. The clouds are so low they seem to melt into the ice. There must be several hundred birds standing on the edge of the ice out towards the middle where the water has not yet frozen. This will be the second year in a row that we have gone into January with open water in Big Simonton. It's still, quiet, as if the earth is sleeping or resting.

We've had a number of lake folks pass away in 2012. Most recently and unexpectedly we lost our friend and neighbor, Rick Goddard. Rick and Pam moved in next door just a couple of years ago. You never know who you're going to get for a neighbor. And, especially on the lake where you share a common "back yard" you hope for good ones. We weren't disappointed. He loved the lake. He loved his family. Their grandkids claimed their yard, pier and lakefront every summer weekend. And, that's just what was happening across the fence at our house. They liked to boat down to Lake Shore (now Flipping Cow) and frequented Pete's for a burger.

Last summer on a hot and humid evening we loaded up Pam, Rick and a bunch of adult friends on the pontoon and anchored in the deep water. It was about midnight. We just jumped in and floated and laughed and reminisced. We shared lake stories and family legends. It was a simple night, a boat, a hot summer evening, and great friends.

Rick was only 61 years old. He died

on the golf course just before Christmas. It was a shock. It is still a shock. I still can't understand that he is gone. Rick was an active member of the Lake Association, a loving husband, father and grandfather. He was greatly respected by his business partners. Over one thousand people stood in line for hours to express their condolences to Pam and the family.

I went up to Varner's Greenhouse just before Christmas. I love to go in there and see the mass of poinsettias carpeting the building. Fields of red are dotted with patches of pinks, whites and striped plants. With Rick's passing, it was a pleasant diversion.

There were so many plants left. I asked the lady at the counter what would happen with them. She said they still had big deliveries to area churches, nursing homes and event centers. But she said that the left over poinsettias weren't their biggest concern. She said they were busy planting geraniums, spikes and vines which will go into their hanging baskets. You know the ones you buy around Mother's day that are bursting out of their plastic pots. Of course they have to be started now.

So, as I look out at the gray, cold lake, I have hope. On the darkest, coldest day of January, the cycle of the seasons continues. The flowers of summer are seeds in pots. Dormant bulbs are in the ground resting and gaining strength for new and better blooms. Bare trees hold within their branches the buds for a fresh set of leaves. It doesn't take away the heartache, but somehow it is reassuring that spring will come again.


Girlfriends,

Martha Nickell's Nearly 60 Years on Simonton Lake

s I was preparing to interview Martha for this article, my thoughts went back and recalled meeting Martha back in the mid-70's. Martha and Earl were the parents of our new neighbors on Christiana Creek, Vaughn and Cindy Nickell. In fact, it is probably because of Martha and Earl that we live on Simonton Lake today. We were invited to the lake over the years and loved it here! Eventually, we made Simonton Lake our home.

Martha had one date with Earl Nickell before he left for the Army serving in WWII at Guadalcanal and Okinawa. While away at war, their relationship grew via snail mail. When Earl returned from the war they were married on June 29, 1946. During the war, Martha worked at Miles making K-rations. After their marriage, the Nickells moved into the cottages which were at the end of the lake behind Pete's. There were 4 or 5



cottages at that time. These cottages were quite small not having a complete bath and definitely not family sized. Vaughn was born while they

lived there in 1947. In a short 14 months, George was born.

Looking for more space for their growing family, the Nickells bought an acre of land on Lakeview, west of Cassopolis, and built a home in 1948. Even though they

were across the road from the lake, it did not keep the family from spending time on the lake and Christiana Creek through the years as the family grew.

In 1967, Nickells bought a very



small cottage on North Shore Drive. Their family had grown again with Kathy born in 1957. The cottage was quite basic with a limited bath and kitchen. They decided to rent it out for a while but their desire to live on the lake won out and they moved the family to the small cottage. They felt they were pretty tough and could handle the primitive living in the cottage for the opportunity to live on the lake.

When Nickells purchased the cottage, it came with a small, homemade pontoon. Eventually, they traded boats but ended up with a speed boat for the kids to ski on the lake. It was during this time an addition was added to the house to bring it up to modern standards. The ski boat was

traded later for a large double decker pontoon. It was/IS orange..."Big Orange" as family calls it. This was purchased from Ernie Johnson in the early 70's and it was



the second double decker pontoon on the lake at that time. Buba, the family's German Shepherd, could be seen out on the lake skiing also! If you


look around the lake on a busy weekend afternoon, you may still see "Big Orange" out there being used by Martha's grandchildren.



Earl was forced to retire early with health issues. He fished guite a lot during this time. Martha worked at CTS and eventually retired after 30 years there in 1990. Earl passed away at 63 in 1988. Martha was involved with the first Simonton Lake Association when the process of getting the lake approved for skiing was happening. She believes what keeps her active and able to participate in many events her family participates in is keeping up with her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren's activities. Updates from the Environment Committee

ECO-ZONE

Amy Matherly is heading this project and it continues to move forward. This winter we intend to visually mark the proposed eco-zone boundaries and record the GPS boundary locations. We've had numerous open meetings and are scheduled to submit our proposal to the State by summertime 2013.

WEIR

Although this project effort is outside our association structure it continues to move forward....sometimes sideways and backwards, but we think the County and State are coming to terms. We could see this project begin as early as fall of 2013, but more likely fall of 2014.

SEDIMENT REMOVAL (DREDGING)

This project is still developing. We received the rough draft of our sediment plan at the end of December.... it still needs tweaking to fall within the \$300,000 LARE funding limit. Five of the Seven sites proposed require 46,000 cubic yards of sediment removal (4,600 cubic yards fully drained). The total project will add approx 10 million gallons of water volume to our lake and should improve the production of our underwater springs. With a total estimated cost of \$435,000, the Environment committee has decided to delay our application to LARE for funding until we can 1.) secure a basin for sediment disposal and 2.) Secure approx \$60,000 for our matching share as required by the State. Bottom line this project will not move forward until these two critical hurdles are cleared.

Where'd we get that Name? Names of our County Rivers and Creeks

The following information, found at the Elkhart County Surveyors website, is accredited to H.S.K. Bartholomew, author of *Stories and Sketches of Elkhart County* printed in 1936.

The **St. Joseph River** was named for Father Joseph, a prominent priest in the area who led a small band of French missionaries, some of the first white people to visit the St. Joseph Valley. His grave is said to be marked by a small wooden cross at the bank of the river, just south of the Niles city limits.

The **Elkhart River**, and in turn the **Little Elkhart River**, derives its name from the original Miami Indian name for the river, "Mishiwa-Teki-sipiwi," which literally translated means "Elk-Heart-River." The Potawatomi at the Matterhorn Conference Center. Throughout the year MHRA receives nominations from the community of prospective candidates,

who are unaware of being named. Beginning in the month of June judges



Indians adopted the name into their own tongue, calling the river "Misiwa-Odaik-Sebi," and in turn the French, some of the first white explorers in the area, labeled the River "Coeur-de-Cerf," which means "Heart of a Stag." The author of Stories and Sketches of Elkhart County notes that the Reverend Isaac McCoy (see Christiana Creek below) used the name "Elksheart" in his writing in 1822, and six years later in 1828, in the Carey Mission treaty of September 20th, the "s" was dropped to become "Elkheart." Finally, during the conception of St. Joseph and Elkhart counties, the "e" was removed and the Elkhart River and Elkhart County were given the names we use today.

Christiana Creek flows south from Osolo Township into the St. Joseph River. The creek was named for Christiana McCoy, wife of a prominent Elkhart County Baptist missionary, who supposedly named the creek after his wife due to the "purity of the begin clandestine evaluations of the nominees. After all the data is collected the winners are announced.


We talked to June on a very snowy night in January about her newfound celebrity status. She said, in addition

waters and beauty of its surroundings." Christiana McCoy washed the family's clothes in the creek, and Mr. McCoy was rumored to have said the true reason he named Christiana Creek after his wife was "because it is rapid at the mouth."

Where Did the Name Simonton Come From? Samuel Simonton Jr. was the 4th recorded landowner of this area around the lake. In 1845, Samuel bought at public auction 63 acres for \$133.34. The previous owner of the land, William H. Wood, had purchased this land for \$1.25 an acre. The village of Elkhart was incorporated as a town in 1858. This created a town government establishing trustees which were comparable to our City Council currently. A.P. 
wasn't enough, he also cooked and served hot food for the firefighters as long as they were at the scene.




