

Why Dredge? Please take a few minutes to read the facts below:

Why do we need to dredge?

WATER QUALITY AND CLARITY A water quality study in 2011 strongly recommended that we remove the sediment in our channels to

improve water quality and clarity. What is sediment and why does it need to be removed?

> Sediment is the small particles of decomposing plant life that accumulate on our lake bottom. It comes from grass clippings, leaves, animal waste and erosion of the soil.

- Even if you never launch a boat or ever go from one lake to the other, you are at risk. **The sediment** circulates right up to every beach on each lake.
- Both the Army Corp of Engineers and the Indiana Department of Natural Resources agree that this sediment is a legitimate lake issue and will permit us to dredge down to the original lake bottom.



What do we need to dredge?

- The main channel from Big Simonton to Little Simonton.
- The area from the main channel to the boat landing.
- IF WE HAVE ENOUGH MONEY, the channel from the main channel to Forrest Lane.
- IF WE HAVE ENOUGH MONEY, the channel from the main channel along North Shore Drive.

NOTE: We will not invade any wetlands or destroy any natural habitat.

Who benefits from the dredging?

 There have been comments made that only the folks who need the main channel to get to Big Simonton will benefit. But, the truth is wherever you live on or near the lake, you will reap some benefit. The sediment cir-

- culates right up to every beach on each lake.
- The water you and your family swim in will be clearer and cleaner.
- Home values will go up because of the improved water quality
- Greater depth will improve boating.

When would the dredging take place?

Late this fall - October/November, 2014.

How can you help?

The cost of the entire project is approximately \$500,000. We have a \$200,000 grant. We have raised about \$50,000. We are applying for additional grants and are planning fund raisers.

1. Personal Donation.

We are asking for a \$500.00 donation from each home on the

- lake or with lake access. Your donation to the dredging fund will go through the Simonton Lake Preservation Trust, a non-profit 501 (c)(3) organization, so that it is tax deductible for you.
- Join the Simonton Lake Homeowners' Association.
 When we apply for grant money from foundations and charitable organizations we must have a high percentage of members around the lake in order to be credible. The annual fee is only \$30 or less, so please join. You'll find a membership form in the newsletter.

Why **Should** you help?

We are fortunate people to have been given the opportunity to live on or near this lake. But with this opportunity comes the awareness that we are its guardians. We, the residents, hope to pass on this lake to

Just Where Is Our State Line?

t was 1827 when Eleazer Kendrick drove wooden stakes into the ground, marking the 105-mile boundary between Indiana and Michigan.

Michigan was headed for statehood, and Indiana leadership would allow it only if the state line was drawn in such a way that Indiana had port access — moving the exist-



ing line, drawn in 1817, 10 miles north. And today, nearly two centuries later, Kendrick's survey is still the only government-recognized line between Indiana and Michigan, though many of the wooden stakes have long since rotted away, according to Indiana's St. Joseph County surveyor John McNamara.

That's why surveyors from five Indiana counties — LaPorte, St. Joseph, Elkhart, LaGrange and Steuben — have come together with surveyors from Berrien, Cass, St. Joseph, Branch and Hillsdale counties in Michigan to begin the process of resurveying and permanently marking the boundary with cement and metal monuments — for once and for all, McNamara said.

They have until July 2018 to get the surveying done and report completed, and \$400,000 for the next two years to fund the work, according to the legislation.

The Indiana-Michigan Boundary Line Commission met for the first time last month after years of legislative work in Indiana and Michigan to establish the group. Members began discussions on how the surveying process would go, and will continue them through the summer.

Ultimately the commission members settled on drafting a request for quotes for survey work from Mile 0 — starting at Lake Michigan — to Mile 20, which is somewhere around Tamarack Road in St. Joseph County, Ind., McNamara said.

The commission considered putting the entire 105-mile line in one bid, but decided against it. "I like five sections, because of the five counties on either side," said Rex Pranger, surveyor for LaGrange County. The line is roughly observed in the right place now, McNamara said, but it isn't definitive and could be a couple of feet off here or there. The original wooden stakes — or sometimes plow points, wagon axles or clay pots filled with stones — have often been lost to time.

Prior to the 2009 legislation that sparked this commission, volunteer groups of surveyors would hunt for the equivalent of a needle in a haystack, searching for these remnants so they could re-establish the mile markers, McNamara said. They've found at least four, but nowhere near what is needed for the entire line.

The uncertainty could lead to problems when it comes to assessments and taxes.

"I was asked by a judge once to testify in a court case where someone was shot on State Line Road," McNamara said. "I had to testify on what side of the state line he was shot on."

That situation was pretty clear, he said, but having a concrete answer is the goal of the commission. Should residents be concerned? McNamara said no, the commission doesn't intend to change people's state of residence.

"We're not going to tell someone that you live in Michigan when you live in Indiana," McNamara said. ■

arly in June when the threat of frost was finally gone, (I'm not sure if that's correct. 



Invasive Weeds - A Threat to Our Lake

n 2011 a Water Quality study was done on Simonton Lake. While Simonton had only minimum evidence of invasive weeds, we need to be watchful. Weeds in the lake grow like weeds in your lawn. They pop up seemingly overnight and thrive even when the "good" plants fail. One of the most invasive is Eurasian watermilfoil. A couple of summers ago large areas of the upper St. Joe River was covered with mats of this weed.

Eurasian watermilfoil (Myriophyllum spicatum) is an exotic aquatic plant that is spread microscopically through boats, buckets, boat trailers, jet skis. This plant forms dense mats across the surface of the water crowding out native species of aquatic vegetation. For a picture of milfoil you can visit http://www.dnr.state.wi.us/invasives/fact.milfoil.htm). The earliest detection of Milfoil in our lake would take immediate action to stop its invasion.

Milfoil has little, if any, environmental value. Milfoil covers the water surface preventing sun from reaching any aquatic life. Can you imagine fishing, boating or swimming in water covered with Milfoil? Management options are

available to control this invasive plant, should we have a problem. One option is biological control such as the introduction of fish, insects



or swans to control milfoil. This is the good news for our resident swans. One pair of swans can maintain an acre of shoreline weed-free.

If you identify milfoil you MUST pull the plant up by

the roots. Cutting the plant encourages growth. Pulling the weed without the roots just means it will return (Managing Aquatic Plant in Indiana Lakes prepared by the Division of Soil Conservation, Indiana Department of Natural Resources and Department of Botany & Plant Pathology, Purdue University).

The Ugly Duckling (Swan) at Simonton Lake

Linda Jimison of Twilight Drive was delighted to see a family of swans swim up their channel but were shocked when the mother abandoned one of her four babies in their yard. Linda attempted to reintroduce the baby to the mother while others distracted daddy with some swan appropriate treats, but mama would have nothing to do with her "ugly duckling (swan)" Linda took in the poor little creature but he or she was quite the little pooper. So after a short while he/she was taken to a special care facility in Bristol.

Swans are known in the animal kingdom as good parents and mate for life. Wildlife experts tell us that mama swan knew something about that particular baby's health and left him behind for that reason.

Wildlife in our Backyard

After the Simonton Lake meeting, Stacy Baskerville of North Shore Drive, noticed a car stopped in the street when she came home. The driver was out of the car and in her headlights was a big snapping turtle. Stacy called her


husband, Kent, who tried to help it cross the street so it would not get run over. The turtle didn't respond to the gentle prodding and instead stuck out his head in a menacing sort of way which made the bystanders back off immediately. Stacy however did get some great pictures.

Worried that the turtle would surely be hit by a motorist Kent went to his garage and got a wide shovel, picked up the turtle and laid him down gently on the other side of the road. The turtle was not measured but you can see in

the picture that he is large enough that he hangs over the edges of the shovel.

Cindy Leslie sent in a picture of a **turtle** nesting in the North Shore Landings neighborhood just a half mile from the site of the Baskerville turtle. Cindy actually measured this turtle at 14 inches long and 12 inches wide.

Maria Hopman, "Simonton Says" photographer, contacted Tim Cataldo at the Elkhart Environmental Center. He explained that it was probably a common snapping turtle, and she was probably searching for a place to lay eggs. If you do come across a snapper in the street, do not attempt to pick it up to move



it out of traffic! It can bend its head back and bite you. If you do pick it up, place your hands towards the rear of the turtle and grasp it by the shell above the rear legs. Do not pick it up by the tail as this can harm the turtle's vertebrae. Also, place the turtle in the same direction that it was going, or it will just turn around and try to continue on its original course.

The carp were getting "frisky" in the lake, recently. You could hear all the splashing in the water (photo below taken by Maria Hopman).

Kayak Crisis Averted on Simonton Lake

Five Easy Tips Can Prevent Future Accidents

ate on the afternoon of May 30, a Lake Drive resident enjoyed the good fortune of finding himself in the right place at the right time.

My neighbor's timely arrival home on a Friday afternoon helped to prevent a serious accident for two kayakers.

In an instant, the light-hearted conversation he heard from the couple changed to one of concern and panic. The male kayaker had rolled his kayak and become extremely fatigued in the water. When he began to have trouble breathing, my neighbor sprang to action.

He met the couple at their location, provided a flotation device to the struggling swimmer and delivered the couple safely to the shore. Thankfully, a horrible tragedy was averted.

For the remainder of the boating season and future ones, kayakers-both novice and veteran--can significantly reduce the potential for accidents by taking a few simple precautions.

Let's work together to enhance everyone's safety and enjoyment of kayaking on Simonton Lake.

If You Fall, Get Back In

Once a kayak has tipped, re-entry can be tricky business. Practice this approach for the greatest success:

- 1. Slide your belly across the boat
- 2. Follow with your bottom
- 3. Finally, re-insert your legs

Get Your Gear...and Use It

Wear your life jacket fastened and snug; a stowed life jacket could prove useless in an emergency.

On rough and treacherous waters such as a rocky river bed, also consider wearing a helmet.

Pack plenty of drinking water too; kayaking is hard work and great exercise.

Be Smart, Stay Alert

First and foremost, plan an outing that is a suitable length and skill level for all participants. Conditions on Simonton Lake or another local waterway can change drastically, and everyone should be adequately prepared.

Take note of any shifts in the weather like fog or precipitation, and respond quickly.

Also, observe the travel patterns of boat traffic and any posted safety warnings.

Prepare for a Cold Snap

There's no doubt that summer is in full effect, but, the brisk weather of autumn will certainly return.

As cooler days approach, monitor the air and water temperature.

According to the U.S. Coast Guard, if either is less than 60 degrees Fahrenheit, wearing fleece layers or a dry suit

is recommended to prevent cold water shock.

So, on the lake, windy days and falling leaves just mean a few more layers and lots more enjoyment.

Play it Safe

Explore available water safety, CPR and first aid courses; the American Cross provides an online course

focused specifically on kayak and canoe safety. The Elkhart County chapter also can be reached at 293-6519 for local course offerings. ■

Life Jackets All are Not Alike

Follow these simple steps to select a safe and well-fitting life jacket:

- Choose the right type of jacket for kayaking and other water activities
- Ensure that the jacket's weight limits meet the needs of the intended user
- Select a U.S. Coast Guardapproved jacket, which is stamped as such
- Confirm that all buckles, straps and zippers function properly; replace any jacket with torn fabric or loose straps
- Become comfortable wearing the jacket for the intended activity






