It's Boating Season! Know the Boating Rules

- Controlled Area: This buoy has a red circle and the information you need is printed inside that circle. On Simonton Lake you will see this buoy with "Slow, No Wake"
- Diver Below: These buoys are set by persons scuba diving on the lake. They are set by the divers themselves and are removed when the divers return to their boats. Stay clear of diver flags.
- Information-On Simonton Lake our Ecozone is marked by several buoys. Only trolling motors are allowed in the Ecozone. No power boats! No wave runners!

Use the chart above to identify the different kinds of buoys on Simonton Lake




REMEMBER By Indiana Boating Law (Section 25) you cannot:

- Moor or attach a boat to a buoy
- Move, remove, displace, tamper with, damage or destroy a buoy.

Buoys are expensive and are purchased, maintained, placed and stored by lake residents. If you see someone tampering with or damaging a buoy, get the boat registration number and report the incident to the DNR 317-232-4160.


You will not be billed in May as we have in previous years. But please remember that the Annual Meeting will continue to be in May.

Happy Mother's Day!



Dear Simonton Lake Area Homeowners Association,

As warmer weather approaches, it is a good time to refresh all of our memories on the common regulations of the Public Freshwater Lakes of Indiana as well as mention permits from DNR. Soon people will be putting their piers back into the lakes, and possibly looking at updating their shorelines. Here is some helpful information you may wish to include in your newsletters or on your association websites.

Things to avoid include permanent piers, sand beaches in the lake, unpermitted seawalls, and barriers to the public. Permanent piers are not permitted by DNR, and if constructed, will need to be removed or converted to a temporary structure. Please only install piers that meet the temporary standards. If you and a couple friends cannot remove it easily with some hand tools, it probably doesn't qualify. Sand cannot be placed in the lake. This might sound funny, but waves pull the sand away and result in filling the lake and covering habitat. With a permit from DNR, you may be able to place pea gravel in a swimming area and pea gravel will stay in place requiring less refreshing in the future. New seawalls need permits from DNR and obtaining a permit may take a few months. Link to application: http://www.in.gov/dnr/water/2455.htm

Some types of seawalls are bad for lakes and may not be allowed in your area. Please contact DNR well in advance of planning your project to avoid problems and delays. Natural style seawalls such as bioengineered or glacial stone are healthier for the lake, less expensive, and easier to obtain permits to construct. Contact DNR for additional information on bioengineered seawalls. At times people will try to configure piers to create a private swimming area or will rope off an area to keep boats out. Areas of exclusive use are not allowed because the public has a vested right in the use of the entire lake.

Issues with piers sometimes arise as well. As the lakes get busier and more congested, there has been an increase in conflicts between neighbors over piers and space for their watercraft. Indiana Public Freshwater Lakes are held in trust for the public by the State. Property owners will have property lines that go to the shoreline. Once lakeward of the shoreline, there are areas in the lake referred to as riparian zones. These areas are not "owned" by the property owner, but are allowed to be used by the property owner as their "riparian right". Riparian zones and riparian rights can be extremely complicated and disputes between landowners can result in hundreds of thousands of dollars litigating a few feet of space in the lake. Our suggestion is to always be good neighbors, work out agreements with neighbors, and avoid placing your pier and boats near the edge of your property where they may interfere with other users. If a riparian zone dispute arises that cannot be resolved between the neighbors, there is a Dispute Process established through the Natural Resources Commission's Division of Hearings. This should always be a last resort, can become extremely expensive, and could result in an order for all involved parties to remove the disputed piers until the matter is eventually resolved.

Aquatic vegetation is important. Those "weeds" out in the lake take up excess nutrients, slow down waves, minimize erosion, and provide food and habitat for fish and other wildlife. Do not use any chemicals to kill vegetation in the lake. You can remove a small amount of vegetation by hand without a permit; however, it may be easier to alter your use to accommodate the vegetation. DNR's Division of Fish and Wildlife regulates vegetation removal and requires a permit for any removal over 625 square feet.

From: Lake Resident RE: Boating Course

I am trying to find a Boating Class for my 15 year-old son. He does not yet have a Driver's License and wants to drive our wave runner this summer? Where do we find this information?

Answer: Simonton Says Staff, DNR Website information

According to the DNR website: Anyone **under the age of 15 years** may not legally operate a vessel powered by a motor of more than 10 horsepower or a PWC.

Anyone **older than 15 years** of age may operate a motorized vessel or PWC if he or she successfully completes a boater safety course approved by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources and possesses a valid Indiana Boater Education Certificate.

The boating class that the DNR offers is an <u>online class</u>. You can access the Study Guide, the actual course and a completion document online at <u>www.boating-ed.com</u>

- The course is online
- There is no minimum age requirement to take this online course.
- You do not have to be a resident of Indiana to take this class.
- The cost is \$29.50
- If you pass, you can download your Boating Education Card
- You must carry the card on the boat or wave runner that you are driving. (A zip-lock bag in the dry compartment is a good place for this.)
- The Indiana Course is approved by the US Coast Guard, so your Boating Education Card will be recognized in all states.

The Simonton Says staff is unaware of any local boating classes. A list provided at the U.S. Coast Guard website shows classes at various times throughout the summer. However the closest sites are: Fort Wayne, Hammond, St. Joe and Chicago.

RE: Flooding

When we had those heavy rains in February our basement flooded. We have lived here for about five years with a dry basement. We have a sump pump but as it tried to keep up, the motor burned out. A new sump pump helped but the carpet was soaked and some furniture ruined.

I know the other people in the county had lots worse flooding than this, but is there any help we can get beyond our homeowner's insurance?

Any tips on clean up?

And, is there any way that we can keep this from happening again?

Answer: Simonton Says Staff, Elkhart County Health Department and Bill Decker of Decker Inspection Services

All of us on the newsletter staff feel for you. Most of us who live around the lake have experienced flooding of some type. This year was especially bad for some. If you have an older home you may have cracks in your basement that let in water when the ground is totally soaked and it has nowhere else to go. Many of us around the lake with basements have at least one or two sump pumps and have lost our sump pumps as you did at the worst possible time.

We hope that your homeowner's insurance covered at least some of your loss but you may want to try calling the county to report your flooding. County officials are trying to get complete information as to what areas where affected. Whether they can help, we cannot say.

As to clean up, by the time the newsletter appears you've already done some of these things but here is what the Health Department advises

After Water Recedes

- Wear protective clothing—coveralls, latex gloves, protective eyeglasses, rubber boots and a face mask, if available.
- Move items out of the flooded area as soon as possible.
- Allow wet items to air-dry as quickly as possible to prevent rot and mildew.
- Open doors and windows. Run your furnace or air conditioner if safe to use. Also use fans and dehumidifiers, if possible.
- Remove all toxic chemicals
- Wash down concrete or brick walls, floors, faucets etc. that have been under water, first with clean water, then soapy warm water. Sweep water down the drain or to the sump pump, and then vacuum with a wet-dry shop vacuum cleaner.
- Disinfect all surfaces and equipment that came into contact with floodwater with a solution of ½ cup of liquid chlorine bleach to a gallon of water. A pump-type garden sprayer works best for large areas, or small items can be dipped in a pail of the chlorine/water solution. Let everything air dry.
- Contaminated foods should be discarded and beverages in bottles or jars should be discarded, if flood waters reached the lids.
- Clean and deodorize carpets or have them professionally cleaned.
- Foam rubber mattresses, pillows, upholstered furniture and stuffed toys are difficult to clean properly. If in doubt that an item can be cleaned properly, it is best to throw it away.

To be prepared for the next flood:

- -Make sure that your roof's gutters and downspouts are in good condition, free of leaves and debris, that they drain at least 6' away from the house
- -You might consider buying a good quality **dehumidifier** for your basement. Even when you don't have wet carpet the moisture level is always higher in your basement.
- -You might consider purchasing a **battery-powered back up sump pump**. If the power goes out, this sump pump will continue to work
- -You might consider having a professional foundation contractor **repair the cracks** in your foundation or hire a company to put in a **drainage system**.

RE: Swimming Area

We are new to the north side of Elkhart. While we don't own lake front property we sure would like our kids to be able to swim at Simonton Lake. Is there a swimming area? If our friend would bring his boat, where can we launch it?

Answer: Simonton Says Staff

To launch your boat onto Simonton Lake, use the state-owned boat launch at the north end of C.R. 109. You are not supposed to swim at the boat launch. There is limited parking. So, if you'd like to get your boat on the water on a busy weekend, get there early. The rules for the boat launch, as well as information about running your boat on the lake are posted near the water's edge.

Simonton Lake does not have a swimming beach. Nearby Heaton Lake does have a nice swimming beach. Many people who have access to water craft come to the sandbar at the east end of the big basin to swim. However, there is no separate swimming area. You'll need to be careful to keep your kids away from propeller blades as well as boats coming and going from the sandbar who might not see your child in the water




