




NEW EMAIL FOR THE LAKE ASSOCIATION



WINTER WATER RESCUE

by Bob Meyers as told to him by Vaughn Nickell

On a Sunday morning in January, Vaughn Nickell had a granddaughter playing volleyball. Vaughn wasn't at the game. However, his granddaughter, who knew her grandfather never missed a game unless he had a good reason, knew that he must have had a good reason. She just didn't know how good a reason it was.

I am going to tell you about that very good reason. This is the story of the rescue of a young man on the main channel between Big and Little Simonton Lakes. This is the information word for word from the rescuer, Vaughn Nickell.

Vaughn's Story:

"First this story sure travels fast, so let me say I'm not a hero as some people have suggested. I only did what most other people would do; I only share this story if it brings awareness that ice is not always safe. So, this is not about me; it is about preventing others from making a similar mistake, and I would appreciate keeping this story in perspective.

Vaughn continues, "On Sunday, January 29 mid-morning, I noticed a young man walking from the west across the Big Lake toward my house (at the sandbar). The lake ice was not very thick and had open-water spots. He came up on my shoreline to walk around some of those spots. I asked him where he was going. He said to his home a few doors down. I cautioned him that the ice was not safe, especially in the channel, but he went on his way.

I was getting ready to leave for my granddaughter's volleyball game but couldn't get it out of my mind that the young man was headed for trouble. I kept checking on him until he disappeared behind my neighbor's house. When I pulled out of my garage, I thought I'd look for him to be sure he was okay. When I got near the gate (to my property) I could see someone in the water. He had broken through. The road was icy, but I sped to the public landing. I realized I didn't have a rope, but I didn't think I had time to go back home for one. So, I continued to get there as quickly as possible. I wasn't sure how long a person could last in icy water, but I knew it wasn't long.

When I got to the landing, I didn't see him, but I could hear him yelling, 'Help!' Then I saw him to the west. I jumped back in my truck and drove to the Robinson cabin (near the landing) thinking about how I was going to get him out. As soon as I got out of the truck, I dialed 911 and ran to where I thought he was. He was about 20-25 yards out. I gave 911 the emergency and location next to the public landing. The 911 operator wanted more information, but I told her I didn't have time to waste. I needed to get this kid out of the water. I hung up.

Fortunately, Casey Ulery, my neighbor, had heard the young man yelling for help and she ran from the house on Maplewood, through the woods to the cabin. She called 911 and stayed on the line. In the meantime, I was scrambling around thinking of how to get this kid out. I didn't want to go in the water and sink into the mucky bottom for fear we'd both be in trouble.

So, I found several 2 x 4's, 8' long, and slid them out to him to grab in each hand and asked him to start crawling to the shore. The 2 x 4's would disperse his weight, and hopefully, keep him on top of the ice. I knew he was tired and not keeping focus, so I kept encouraging him to keep coming in my direction. Finally, I was able to grab him and lift him out of the lake. As I was walking him to my truck to warm up, the ambulance and fire truck pulled up and took him to the hospital.

I've not talked to the young man since, but I did nee his father the next day, and I could tell he was very appreciative. This could have been a very bad day, but fortunately, the Lord was watching over us.

Lessons learned; bad ice is very dangerous, especially if you go through with no one around."

That was Vaughn's story, so here's mine. Vaughn Nickel is a hero. So is Casey Ulery. Vaughn could have ignored the situation and headed for his granddaughter's volleyball game. He didn't. Casey Ulery could have ignored the call for help and remained in her warm house. She didn't. They both became involved. Both are heroes.

This isn't the first act of heroism by Vaughn. He is a United States Marine who served our country in Viet Nam, where he was a hero many times over.

To Vaughn's granddaughter: thank you for having a grandfather who is a hero. Thank you for playing volleyball that Sunday morning in January so your grandfather would have to leave his garage to go to your game and was able to spot that young man in the water and perform a very brave act.

IF someone falls through the ice

Call 911

Toss them a floatation device. This can be a life jacket, empty water jug or any buoyant object.

REACH the victim with a long pole, board, rope, blanket or jumper cables.

Build a human chain in which rescuers lie on the ice with each person grasping the feet of the person in front. Once on the ice, roll away from the weak or broken ice; do not attempt to stand up.

LEPRECHAUN LEAP RETURNS to Simonton Lake

The Leprechaun Leap, a fundraiser benefiting Cancer Resources of Elkhart County returned to Re-Pete's on Simonton Lake this March. The last Leap was held here in 2019. That year the fundraiser was in its 14th year and about 300 people attended.

While the winter was mild this year with very little ice, in past years volunteers from the Simonton Lake Sportsmen's Club had to chop a hole in the ice for the jumpers to do their jobs.

Cancer Resources of Elkhart

Cancer Resources provides financial and emotional support to cancer patients in Elkhart County as they undergo treatments. Founded in 1958, the organization relies on individual donations, private grants, and fundraisers like the Leprechaun Leap to continue offering its programs and services. Cancer Resources is a relatively new name after it was updated from United Cancer Services in 2018. The change was intended to better identify the group as a locally based grassroots service unaffiliated with regional or national organizations.

Sportsman's Club Volunteers

Members of the Simonton Lake Sportsman's Club directed traffic for the event.



WHAT NOT TO PUT INTO THE SEWER

There are some things you can do to make your grinder pump continue to work.

> Remember these letters: F.O.G.S. **F** stands for Fats **O** stands for Oils **G** stands for Grease

S stands for Sanitary "disposable" wipes

Grease and fats clog up pipes which eventually need to be cleaned out. And, those disposable sanitary wipes, well, for our system, they are NOT disposable.

BOTTOM LINE: DO NOT PUT F.O.G.S INTO THE SYSTEM!

Conservancy Purposes

The Conservancy deals with the following: Drainage, Erosion, Sewer, Sediment Removal, Weed Control, issues that improve recreational use of the lake (Example: ADA Compliant Pier)

ADA Compliant Pier

The Conservancy Board received word that the ADA Compliant Pier will be installed soon at the Simonton Lake Public Landing. The DNR will install the ramp and will remove it in the fall.

Summer Weed Spraying

Check the SLSC website for dates of summer weed spraying.

If you get a card from Aquatic Weed Control, then the chemicals they are using are harmful to your lawn. The card says not to use your sprinkler system.

If you see Aquatic Weed Control spraying but you have not received a card, DON'T PANIC! The chemicals they are using are **not** harmful to your lawn.

After every spraying near your property a yellow flag will be placed in your lawn.

SLCD Website

The Conservancy has a website that has information on paying your sewer bill, board meeting minutes, upcoming projects, and board members. Did you know you can now pay your sewer bill online? Just go to the SLCD website and click on "Pay Online" on the menu bar!


channel to water yards and ornamental plants. Residents can fish and swim right away after our application.

DRY HYDRANTS

WHAT IS A DRY HYDRANT?

A dry hydrant is an unpressurized, permanently installed pipe that has one end below the water level of a lake or pond. This end usually has a strainer to prevent debris from entering the pipe. The other end is above ground and has a hard sleeve connector.

WHY DO WE NEED THEM?

The Simonton Lake Conservancy has been looking into the idea of placing dry hydrants at a couple of spots on the lake. In case of a fire in our area, trucks can simply hook on to the dry hydrant connector and fill their tanks. The alternative is for the truck to be sent to the

public landing, losing valuable time while a structure burns.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

6" PVC Pipe

One end of the water pipe would need to be in at least six feet of water. The line itself would be buried underground with the connector at the other end placed at the street.

At this time, the Conservancy is still in the planning phases looking for suitable sites where the required six-foot water depth can be found. Look for more information on this project in the months to come.

SIMONTON LAKE BEGINS YEAR TWO OF WATER TESTING

As reported last August, Simonton Lake had been chosen to participate in a state-wide program sponsored by the Indiana DNR, IDEM and IU Bloomington called the Clean Water Initiative. At that time only 100 of Indiana's lakes had been approved.

What is the Clean Water Initiative?

The question asked by many lake residents is: How clean is our water? Unless we hire a company to test, we have no scientific data to give us that answer. But, by doing bi-weekly testing we will have that answer. We also can compare our data to other lakes our size and find out what other lakes are doing to keep their water clean.

How did we do Last Year?

In our first year of testing, we were only allowed to test for water clarity and transparency. We have gotten the data from the State for 2022. In August when we began testing the water was clear at the testing site to a depth of a little over 7 feet. A few weeks later in September the clarity went to 8.08 feet.

What's Next?

This year we need to complete an entire season of testing for clarity and transparency. In 2024 we will be testing for: temperature, dissolved oxygen, phosphorus, nitrogen, and chlorophyll, invasive species, and Algal blooms.

We are in need of a person or two who would boat or paddle out into the middle of Little Simonton, one time every other week and drop the disc over the side and see how far down they can see the disk. That's all! Real easy!

DEER DROWNING FOLLOW UP

While we reported this incident in our February issue, we received this report from the Osolo Fire Department and wanted to share it with you.

On Tuesday, January 10, several residents of Simonton Lake called 911 and reported a deer on the ice covering the lake.

The Osolo Fire Department was dispatched at 5:10. When firefighters arrived at the scene, they saw a buck about 800 yards from shore. The crew put on wet suits, inflated their "banana boat" and began chopping at the ice. Firefighters realize a deer, especially the male is a strong animal that would put up a fight rather than be captured. This was taken into consideration in the rescue effort.

Firefighters found the ice too thin to walk on and too thick for a boat to navigate to the animal. They attempted to follow the path of the deer, however, the tracks kept freezing over. A lake resident loaned firefighters a flatbed Jon boat. Rescue attempts using this boat also failed. However, firefighters continued to reach the deer.

At 6:30 p.m. it became too dark to see and the rescue attempt was terminated.

NOTE: Later in the winter the body of the deer floated up to a seawall on Lake Drive and was removed from the water by the DNR.

REMINDERS

- Don't try an ice rescue by going out onto the ice!
- Stay on shore and call 911
- Beyond giving your location to the dispatcher, line up the person or animal in trouble with a point across the lake.
- Keep your eye on the victim.

- Did you know that 15-year-olds can operate watercraft only if they complete a boater education course approved by the Department of Natural Resources and have on board an ID card issued by the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles?

SPRAYING FOR INVASIVE WEEDS

Each year the Simonton Lake Conservancy pays for the spraying of invasive weeds. (PLEASE TAKE A LOOK AT THE PICTURES OF INVASIVE WEEDS ON THIS PAGE.) Only the areas of the lake that have these invasive weeds are sprayed. The company the Conservancy has contracted with is Aquatic Weed Control, a company owned by Jim Donahoe.

Spraying for Invasive weeds on Simonton Lake is done twice each year.

If the weed spraying is going to be harmful to your lawn the company tries to get prior notice to homeowners by U.S. Mail, and a yellow flag like the one below will be placed in your yard. You can see from the notice below that the homeowner is warned not to use the sprinkling system for three days after the spraying. If you get a notice like this and have neighbors who have gone out of town and might not have gotten the mailed notice, texting or emailing them would be the neighborly thing to do.

According to Jim Donahoe at Aquatic Weed Control, they use both algicides and herbicides in the channels to control the weeds and the algae. The herbicides used to control the weeds in the channels are the ones that require a 3-day irrigation restriction.

When Aquatic Weed Control sprays specifically for Starry Stonewort, which is NOT harmful to your lawn, you will NOT get prior notice. But a yellow flag will be placed in your yard just so you know they have sprayed.

Mr. Donahoe also states that none of the herbicides or algicides used have swimming restrictions and that the restrictions on using the water are only for the treated area and not the entire lake. If there is no sign in their yard, they are fine to use the water.



ISSUES AT THE SIMONTON LAKE PUBLIC ACCESS CONTINUE

Each spring as the weather gets warmer, use of and abuse of public landing increases.

Those of us with boats need Public Access to launch our boats. But the abuses are annoying.

Can we close the landing?

No, Simonton Lake is a public lake. The State of Indiana owns the Simonton Lake Public Access.

Can't the HOA enforce the Rules?

The Simonton Lake HOA can work with and communicate with the DNR Conservation Officer when there are problems. But the HOA does not make or enforce the rules.

What about the Conservancy? Can they help?

The Simonton Lake Conservancy works with the DNR on maintenance and improvements, but the DNR has the final word. The Conservancy does not make or enforce the rules.

Is Swimming Allowed at the Landing?

As posted on a sign at the landing, swimming is allowed but not within 100 feet of the boat launch. The swimmers we have seen at the access are not following this rule. If they did, they would be swimming in the lily pads. This is a scary situation with boat motors running nearby.



Is Fishing Allowed?

Fishing is allowed at the access, but you must have a fishing license.

What can I do when there is an issue in the parking lot or on C.R. 109?

The landing parking lot is marked for a certain number of vehicles. One spot is clearly marked for the DNR Conservation Officer. Some areas are marked "No Parking". C.R. 109 is clearly marked "No Parking. The boat ramp has been blocked by visitors who park their vehicles and trailers in "No Parking" zones.

When you see any of these issues make a phone call:

DNR ISSUES - Parking spot issues, blocking the launch, swimming too near the In mid-April this year graffiti was found on the information signs at the Simonton Lake public landing.

launch, or other DNR rule violations should be communicated to the DNR.

Contact: DNR Law Enforcement Central Dispatch 812-837-9536

ELKHART COUNTY SHERIFF ISSUES-Altercations or suspicious or dangerous activity in the parking lot, parking in "no parking" areas on C.R. 109, or other problems NOT involving DNR rules should be reported to the Elkhart County Sheriff.

A sign at the access sponsored by the HOA tells visitors who can drive a boat, information about life preservers, which direction to drive around the lake, driving speeds after sunset, parking at the access parking lot and idle speeds. Whether visitors to our lake read the sign, we can't say.

CRIME REPORT

Beginning in early **December** the HOA received several reports of Porch Pirates.

Feb. 4 - A 1997 Jeep Wrangler was stolen from S&H Auto Sales, S.R. 19.

January 13-14 - A catalytic converter was stolen from a vehicle parked in the 51000 block of North Shore Drive.

March 9 - A suspect walked into a garage on Lakewood through a door which was not locked. He stayed for a few minutes then left going past the Ring camera. Twelve minutes later he again entered the garage turning on a flood light and the garage opener light. He then entered the home through the inner garage door. The suspect was in the home for just a few seconds when the alarm beeped, and the siren went off.

The camera caught him running just before the alarm. In the few seconds he was in the home he was able to take two purses and a diaper bag. The lost items in one of the purses included an ID requiring the owner to have documents overnighted to her so that she could fly home.

March 19 - A resident of Lake Drive who was walking his dog noticed shoe prints in the snow which led from car to car along the street. The incident was reported to the Elkhart County Sheriff.

April 10 - The riprap (stone) that was placed along the shoreline at the Public Landing has all been removed. Residents reported seeing a vehicle loading the stone and pulling away.
