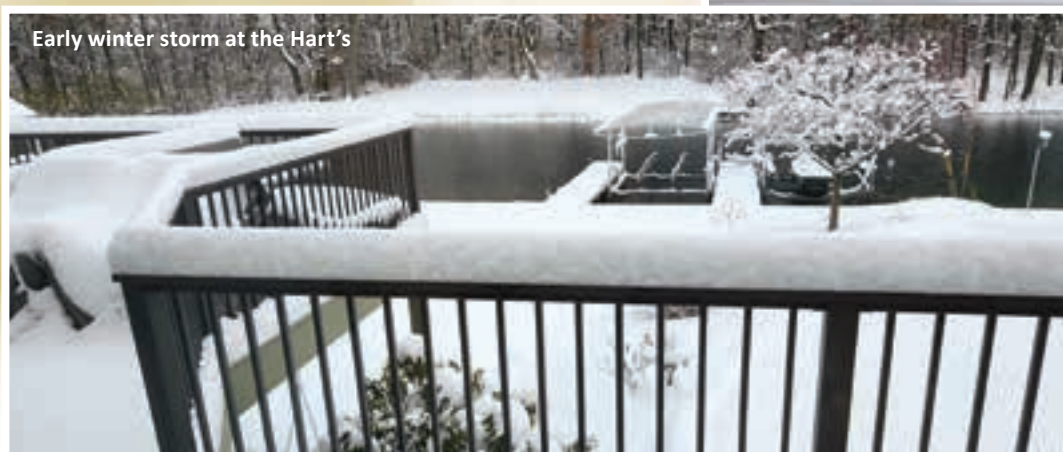

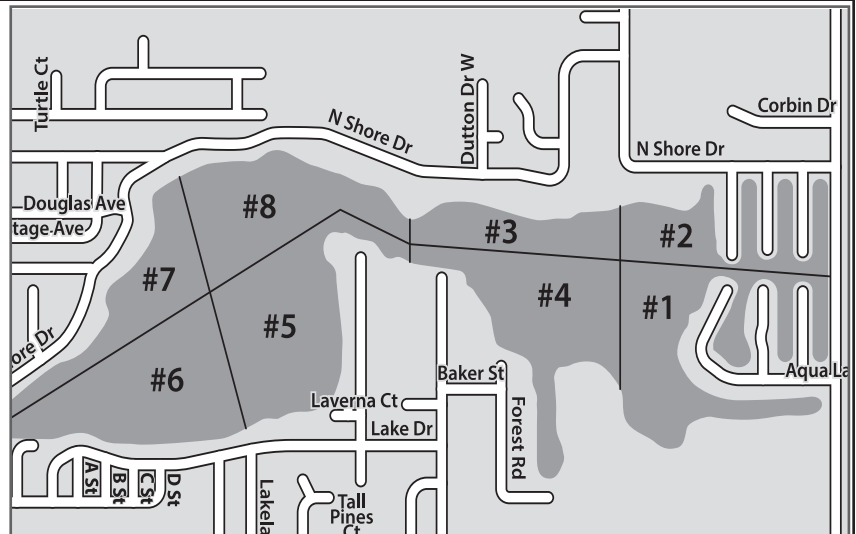

THINK YOUR CATCH IS A STATE RECORD?

The Indiana DNR has two competitions: The State Record Fish competition and the Fish of the Year

THE STATE RECORD FISH COMPETITION:

- Size is determined by weight measurement first, then length. Both weight and length measurements are required.
- The weight measurement must be taken before the fish is frozen and on a scale that has been certified by the State of Indiana to be accurate to 1 ounce.
- Each District Fisheries Office has a certified scale. Please call ahead to make an appointment with a biologist to have your fish weighed. Or, you can have your fish weighed at a store with a certified scale like a grocery store, hardware, or feed store. To find certified scales near you, call the Indiana Division of Weights and Measures at (317) 356-7078.
- You must have two witnesses who are not relatives who observed the length and/or weight measurements. Photos are required. The entry form and additional rules can be found at the Indiana DNR website. The completed entry form may be submitted online.

FISH OF THE YEAR COMPETITION

- Entry must be submitted online or emailed by Dec. 15 of the calendar year when the fish was caught. Entries received after deadline will be eligible for the following year.
- Size is determined by a total length measurement, or fork length for shovelnose sturgeon. No weight measurement is required for Fish of the Year.
- Provide a good quality photograph(s) of the fish (full sideview on measuring board or next to measuring tape) clearly showing the measurement as described above.
- Optional: Provide an additional photo of the angler with their fish for annual winner summary.
- One witness, who is not a relative, who observed the length measurement, must be provided.
- Provide a copy of the angler's fishing license, if required.
- The entry form is available online at the Indiana DNR website.

CRIME REPORT

MAN YELLING AND OBSTRUCTING TRAFFIC ON FAWN LANE

On January 5 Police responded to calls from residents on Fawn Lane (near Dolph Road) reporting a man yelling and obstructing traffic. Police transported the man to Elkhart General Hospital for complaints of frostbite to his feet.

BREAK IN AT TOASTED TURTLE TAVERN

Police responded to Toasted Turtle Tavern (formerly My Dad's Place) on January 6 for report of a burglary. The tavern had previously been burglarized in October. The front door had been shattered, and a shed had been broken into. The suspect had left the scene. Damage was estimated at around \$4,100.

The overnight security footage showed a suspect arriving around 4:27 a.m. The cameras captured the man using a shovel to break into the shed and then to apparently break the front door to the restaurant.

Officers recognized the man from several early morning incidents on January 5. Police responded to a report of a man yelling and obstructing traffic on Fawn Lane (near Dolph Road). They transported the man to transported to the hospital for a complaint of frostbite to his feet.

Police found the man still in the hospital emergency room lobby. He was arrested.



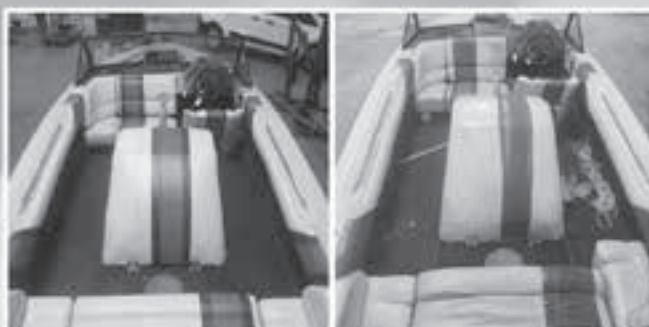

NORTHERN PIKE IN SIMONTON LAKE

Northern Pike ARE out there swimming in Simonton Lake. Back in 1940 a 46 lb. Northern Pike was caught in Great Sacandaga Lake in the state of New York. Here's some information on our aquatic neighbor, the Northern Pike.

ARE NORTHERN PIKE NATIVE TO SIMONTON LAKE?

Northern Pike are native to North America and Indiana. Indiana represents the southernmost extent of their natural range, where they inhabit approximately one-third of Indiana's 452 northern glacial lakes. Simonton Lake is one of those glacial lakes. Pike also exist in many of Indiana's northern rivers including the Elkhart and St. Joseph. Pike have been introduced to lakes and reservoirs further south in Indiana, but they are only natural to the Northern Indiana

WHAT DO NORTHERN PIKE EAT

Northern Pike are aggressive, opportunistic carnivores whose diet is primarily other fish, but they'll eat almost anything they can fit in their mouths, including fish (perch, suckers, walleye), amphibians (frogs, snakes), small mammals (mice, voles, shrews), and waterfowl (ducklings, birds). If food is scarce, pike will eat other pike.

Northern Pike do have teeth. They have many rows of sharp, backward-slanting teeth lining their mouths, so they can grip and hold prey. Northern Pike are not going to come after you when you are swimming. But once caught you need to be careful getting the pike off your hook.

HOW BIG DO THEY GET?

They grow rapidly. The Indiana state record pike is 30 pounds, 2 ounces (48¼ inches), caught at Clear Lake (Steuben County) in 1992 by Jack Barnes.

WHAT DO THEY LOOK LIKE?

Northern Pike are most often olive green, shading from yellow to white along the belly. The side is marked with short, light bar-like spots and dark spots on the fins. Sometimes, the fins are reddish. The lower half of the gill cover lacks scales, and it has large pores on its head and on the underside of its lower jaw. Unlike the similar looking muskie, the northern pike has light markings on a dark body background and fewer than six pores on the underside of each side of the lower jaw.

WHERE DO THEY LIVE

The primary habitat requirements of Pike include year-round access to cool water. Pike spawn early, swimming into shallow spawning water right after the ice melts on natural lakes.

"The preferred spawning habitat for Pike is seasonally flooded wetlands and permanently submerged aquatic vegetation. Recently hatched pike will use these shallow vegetated areas for food and protection from predators. After the spawning period, adult pike will progressively migrate deeper in the water column in search of cool water as spring and summer surface temperatures warm the water."

LIMITS IN INDIANA

Pike are regulated under a statewide three fish bag limit and a 24-inch minimum size limit. But, Hamilton Lake (Steuben County) has a six fish daily bag limit and no minimum size limit (no more than one per day more than 30 inches).

ARE NORTHERN PIKE A GOOD OR BAD THING TO HAVE IN OUR LAKE

Whether you want Northern Pike in your lake depends on your goals and the lake's specific ecosystem. Northern Pike are predators and their presence has benefits and drawbacks.

Potential Benefits of Northern Pike

- Pike help regulate the populations of abundant, smaller fish species, preventing overpopulation.
- Pike can help control invasive or nuisance fish species.
- Pike are a popular and exciting sport fish.

Potential Drawbacks of Northern Pike

- Pike eat desirable fish, such as young bass or panfish, which can negatively impact sport fish populations.
- Pike eat fingerlings and can hurt our attempts to stock our lake.

SEEMS LIKE THE NORTHERN PIKE IS A NEW TYPE OF FISH IN SIMONTON LAKE

There are some fishermen who feel that Northern Pike were put in the lake in the last few decades by some well-meaning person. We have no proof of that. The Indiana DNR tells us that Northern Pike are natural to glacial lakes in northern Indiana. However, currently we do not stock Simonton Lake with Northern Pike.

ARE PIKE GOOD TO EAT?

If you look on the internet you will find lots of posts saying yes, and about the same number saying no. According to these posts they are a bony fish, don't freeze well and are best cooked right after catching.

WHAT NOT TO PUT INTO THE SEWER

Remember these letters: F.O.G.S.

F stands for Fats

O stands for Oils

G stands for Grease

S stands for Sanitary "disposable" wipes

CONSERVANCY PURPOSES

The Conservancy deals with the following: **Sewer System, Drainage, Erosion, Sewer, Sediment Removal, Weed Control, Issues that Improve Recreational Use of the Lake** (Example: ADA Compliant Pier).

If you are new to the lake, you will want to contact the Conservancy District to make sure your account is in order and that the name of the bill is yours.

BE CAREFUL WHERE YOU DIG!

The sewer system is pressurized. If you puncture the line, you will have a fountain of sewage. **Call 811 before you dig!**

SUPERMARKETS SOLD

Martin's Supermarkets, a staple in our lake community for decades, were sold back in 2018. Now they have been sold again, this time to C&S Wholesale Grocers based in New Hampshire. What will this mean for shoppers? Will the Wednesday Senior Discount Day continue? Will prices go up, down or stay the same?

Martin's Super Market started in South Bend and was owned by the Martin family. Now there are Martin's Supermarkets in towns across northcentral Indiana. There are four stores in Elkhart. The closest one to Simonton Lake is at CR4 (Sanford Road) and State Road 19 (Cassopolis Street). WHAT HAPPENS UNDER THE ICE?

Water freezes at 32 degrees Fahrenheit. But that doesn't mean, however, when the air temperature reaches 32 degrees the lakes freeze. Water is a great insulator and good at holding heat, which is why the lake temperature doesn't fluctuate much day to day like the air does. Therefore, below freezing temperatures are needed for a week or more to form ice on a large lake.

Water is a unique substance in that the solid form (ice) is lighter than the liquid form (water). For most substances, the solid form is heavier. If ice sank, lakes would freeze from the bottom up and the fish and other aquatic creatures wouldn't survive the winter!

Since water is good at holding heat, the more water there is, the more heat it will hold. This is why large deep lakes take longer to freeze and melt than small shallow lakes. When Big Simon-ton freezes completely, Lake Wawasee and Lake Tippecanoe to the south which are larger and deeper may still be open.

WHAT IS "TURNOVER"?

The water is most dense at 39 degrees Fahrenheit. When the water at the top gets to 39 degrees, it sinks. Water on the bottom comes to the top. Scientists call this the "turnover." This is important because it redistributes oxygen throughout the water in the lake. This top layer of water interfaces with the cold air, which cools the top of the lake even further until it freezes. Windy days cool the lake surface off faster.

WHAT ABOUT THE FISH?

Fish are cold blooded, meaning their body temperature matches their environment. Colder temperatures mean a reduction in their metabolism. Fish are often classified as cold water, cool water, and warm water species. The warm water species will seek out the warmest water they can, which is often found at the bottom of the lake or pond. They hunker down in these areas and enter a state of torpor, reducing their respiration and using as little energy as possible.

When ice forms across the surface of a lake, it seals off the water from atmospheric oxygen exchange and blocks out much of the light that is necessary for aquatic plants and phytoplankton to produce oxygen within the lake. Throughout the winter oxygen levels in the lake slowly decline. This presents a serious challenge to fish, because if the lake stays frozen for too long, oxygen levels can become low enough to kill them.

WHAT ABOUT THE OTHER PLANTS AND ANIMALS THAT CALL THE LAKE HOME?

Phytoplankton, small single-celled photosynthetic organisms, produce thick-walled resistant cells that settle to the bottom of the lake where they overwinter. Other plants essential to water quality go dormant in the winter. (Too bad the invasive weeds don't suffer from the cold.)

The ice is great for winter sports, but it is also important to the health of the lake.

ROGER ROBISON

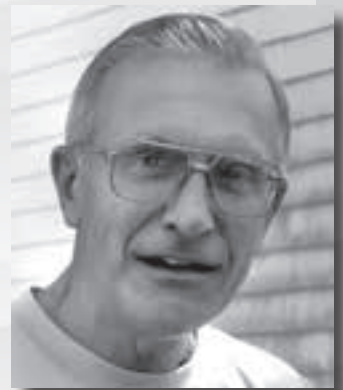

NO MORE PENNIES



The last U.S. pennies were minted on Nov. 12, 2025, in Philadelphia. According to Maryclaire Dale, writer for the Associated Press, it cost the mint four cents for every one cent penny that was made.

Pennies can still be used but they will no longer be made. In the history of the United States "the last coin to be discontinued was the half-cent coin back in 1857."

"After the discontinuation of the penny retailers were concerned as their supplies ran low. Some rounded prices down and others pleaded with customers to bring exact change. Some banks across the nation began rationing supplies."

An interesting fact is that "the nickel costs nearly 14 cents to make, the dime costs 6 cents to produce and the quarter nearly 15 cents."

Coins, including the half-penny, penny, nickel, dime, quarter, half dollar and dollar, were first produced in 1793 one year after Congress passed the Coinage Act. "Back then a penny could get you a biscuit, a candle or a piece of candy."

Discontinuing the minting of new pennies will save \$56 million according to the U.S. Treasurer Brandon Beach.

GOSHEN DAM POND DREDGING PLANS CANCELED



The Goshen Dam Pond is located south of State Road 119 and just north of the Kercher Road bridge over the Elkhart River.

About the time the Simonton Lake HOA was planning a dredging project here at our lake, residents on a section of the Elkhart River known as the Goshen Dam Pond were attempting to do the same.

There were many differences between the two projects.

- A river constantly brings in sediment.
- We have no creeks or rivers feeding our lake. Our lake is spring-fed. With good erosion control, keeping speed boats in the marked waterways and limiting our boats to no-wake speed where indicated, we control the amount of sediment already there from being re-suspended in our water. New sediment is minimal.
- We asked for donations. They established a tax district. We also sought grants and received over \$50,000. They did not receive the funding they needed.
- We had secured land for depositing the sediment, they had not.
- We had secured our permit from the Indiana DNR Lake and River Enhancement Program (LARE) because we had all the prerequisites that the State of Indiana required.

While the area is referred to as a pond, it is actually a wide portion of the river created by a dam at the north end.

TAXING STOPPED

A special tax district was formed in 2014 to collect assessments from nearby property owners to remove sediment from the pond. While some labor and funding were committed early on, the project never secured the millions of dollars needed to complete the work.

Having been stopped from dredging through the LARE program, pond residents tried another route. They had a study done in 2019 to see if dredging the pond would prevent flooding. The study found that dredging the pond would NOT prevent future flooding.

Elkhart County Commissioners ended the district's taxing authority in 2022.

WHAT NOW HAPPENS TO THE MONEY LEFT IN THE SPECIAL TAXING ACCOUNT?

Dozens of riverfront residents attended the Commissioners January 5th meeting, with many urging that the remaining funds be spent on conservation or restoration efforts along the river rather than restarting dredging.

A smaller group of residents argued the remaining money in the fund should be returned to those who paid into the district.

Commissioners said refunding the assessments would likely cost the county more than the amount remaining, noting that some of the money has already been spent and that tracking individual payments would be difficult.

While the taxing authority ended in 2022, the Goshen Dam Pond District was formally dissolved at the Commissioner meeting on Monday, January 5th. No decision was made on how to use the remaining funds.

Here at Simonton Lake we completed a big dredging project with over 50,500 Cubic Yards of sediment removed.

(A cubic yard is one yard, by one yard, by one yard. Think of a box that is 36 inches long, 36 inches wide and 36 inches high!)

We still have an area at the west end of Big Simonton that was approved for dredging. That Phase was not completed because we did not have the funding.

Now, the charter of the SIMONTON LAKE CONSERVANCY includes dredging projects. Any new dredging projects will be funded and managed by the Conservancy. The Conservancy is putting money aside to complete that final phase of dredging. Permits are being sought.

HOUSE FIRE

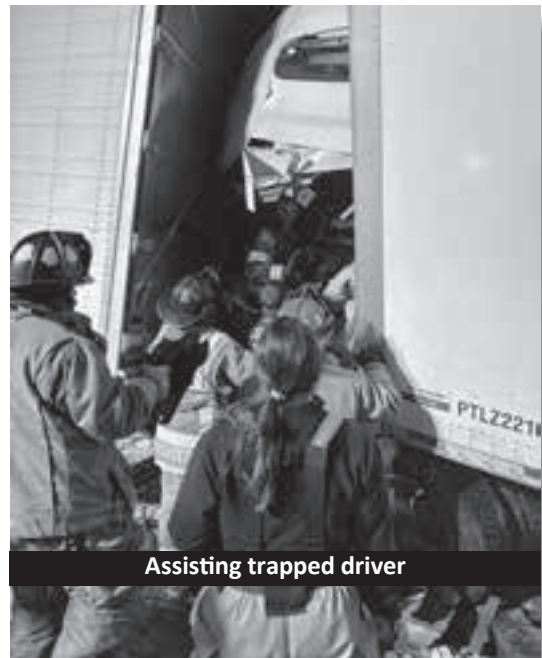
At approximately 3:30 on December 18, members of A Shift responded to a reported house fire in the 26000 Block of Parkview Ave. Parkview Ave. runs east and west intersecting State Road 19 at the One Stop Furniture Mattress Store. The fire was on the street to the east of St. Rd. 19.

Members arrived on scene to heavy fire and smoke coming from an attached garage that had already collapsed by the time first units arrived. The fire was starting to work its way into the residence, which was unoccupied as it was undergoing renovations, but thanks to a quick and aggressive fire attack, damage to the home was kept to a minimum. Assisting Osolo Fire were Bristol Fire Department, Cleveland Township Fire Department, Elkhart Firefighters Local 338 Engine 6 and Engine 7 as well as Battalion 106, and the Osolo EMS. We are proud to serve the residents of Osolo Township and strive to continue to provide the best possible care.



TOLL ROAD CRASH

On January 14 at approximately 4pm, Osolo Township Fire Department and EMS were dispatched to the 93-94 mile marker of the Indiana Toll Road. Units were initially informed that there were multiple vehicles involved and upon arrival, found approximately 20-30 vehicles including cars and tractor trailers, involved in a large pileup blocking both eastbound and westbound traffic.



Due to the large number of vehicles involved, multiple mutual aid agencies were contacted to begin bringing manpower and equipment. One of the patients was entrapped in his semi requiring heavy extrication due to the extent of the damage. We are happy to announce that in all, there were no fatalities and minimal patients with minor to moderate injuries. 

ASSUME ALL ICE OUT THERE IS THIN ICE

FROM THE SAFETY COMMITTEE

We still have weeks of winter left. So, here are your safety reminders.

1. Drill a test hole near shore. Your test hole should show at least a four-inch thickness of clear ice like the ice you get from your freezer.
2. Wear a life jacket for extra warmth and safety.
3. Not all the ice on the lake is the same thickness.
4. Ice strength can also change. Thick ice is rotten after rain. Old honey-combed ice or slushy ice is weak ice.
5. Wind, waterfowl, and beavers can also keep areas of ice from being thick.
6. The water in the area near Lily Creek may still be flowing into the creek. Flowing water under the ice makes the ice unreliable.
7. Water near an aerator may freeze with inconsistencies in the thickness.
8. Underground springs and wind can cause weakness in the ice.

ICE SAFETY GUIDELINES

ICE THICKNESS WHAT TO DO

1" of ice-----	STAY OFF!!!
4" of ice-----	Needed for safe ice fishing
5" of ice-----	Needed for snowmobiling
8" of ice-----	Needed to support the weight of a car or light truck
10" of ice-----	Needed to support a medium weight truck

ICE FISHING REMINDERS

- Indiana law limits ice fishing holes to a diameter of twelve inches.
- Fishing shanties must have reflectors on each side so snowmobiles won't crash into them at dusk or during snowstorms.



If you see a pet or other animal in distress on the ice, do not venture out after it. The ice may be able to support the pet or animal, but not you. Instead, contact local emergency response personnel, who are trained and equipped to make rescues on thin ice.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND A HYPOTHERMIC ANIMAL

1. Do NOT feed.
2. Do NOT submerge in water.
3. Do NOT bring inside out of the weather.
4. Do NOT dry the animal off.
5. Do NOT stroke to stimulate the blood flow.
6. DO get to a vet immediately!

If you feed a kitten with a temperature below 97°, you can kill it!

If you warm them up too fast, you can kill it!

If the animal is frozen to the ground, do not pull it off! Instead, get LUKEWARM water and pour it around and under the animal. DO NOT use hot water. Once free, immediately dry the animal off, wrap it in a dry towel and get it to the nearest vet.
